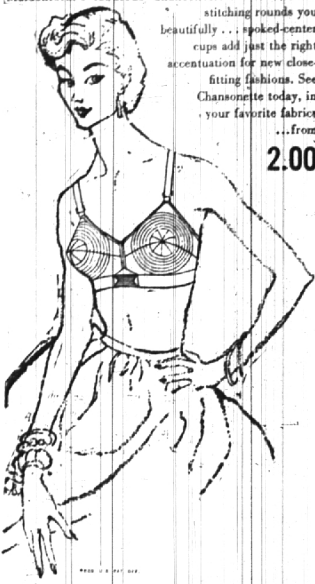


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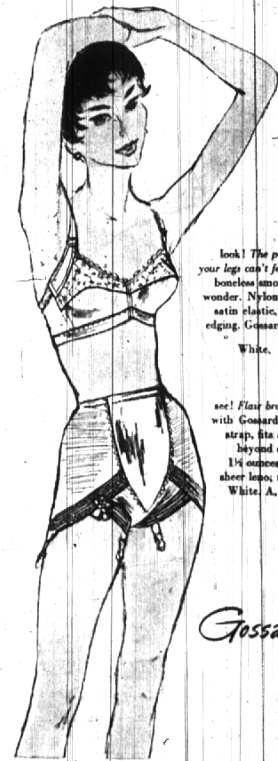

Mothers Learn First, Then Help Teachers with Nursery Children

Mothers who have learned their own lessons in a class are joined together in guiding three-to-kindergarten-age youngsters in the Bloomfield Cooperative Nursery school.

Began during the war years, the school is conducted at Christ Church, with rooms rented by the organization. This year there are 22 enrolled in the senior group, and 21 in the three-year-old, junior group.

Instructions are given by Mrs. Jack Adams, who taught school before she married and had her own family, and by Mrs. Bruce Van Dusen, also a former school teacher.

A TOUR THROUGH the school, in about three hours begins the mother's training. Then in a training morning, the mother learns how to assist youngsters without her own child present. The time devoted is necessary, the teachers feel, to make the mothers into adequate aides.

Example of teacher-mother work is rule that a mother calls the teacher in case of a child's act of aggression. The mother doesn't correct or chastise but leaves that

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ADVANTAGE of the cooperative nursery is that the mother doesn't just drop the child off there in the morning, with no knowledge of his day's activities. And the mother learns with the child, for seeing the child with other children gives her a comparison.
Father gets in the act, too, for he helps keep the toys in repair. Mothers meet monthly at one of their homes, and outings, such as the Oct. 24 trip to the cider mill in Rochester, and Oct. 28 trip to Twin Pines dairy in Detroit, are scheduled, with children going along.
