

## Artists Note Oslo Casting Trip; Ready For Weaving Show

"It's ready to cast," is a point where a sculptor takes a sigh of relief, looks back over months of work, and thinks forward to when the shining metal casting is turned out.

Such a point was reached by Marshall Fredericks last week on one of his larger projects. It was a huge pair of hands that sheltered and held the figure of a youth, holding a book and reaching upward as if for knowledge and inspiration.

Months ago, the photos of earlier stages were taken, to show how a sculptor works from foot-high carved clay, to the finished smoothed down clay piece.

BUT EVERY sculptor doesn't then ship his items off to his own studio in Norway, as Fredericks does. The hand sculpture will go to Oslo, where he has eight Norwegians engaged in carving, casting and polishing his works.

This work will go into Dallas' new public library when it returns to this country next Spring, Fredericks says.

Shipping is by Norwegian freighter, direct from Detroit to Oslo, and thence, when done, to Houston, Texas. Railroads can't handle such a large piece that chips so easily, though it is reinforced inside with steel.

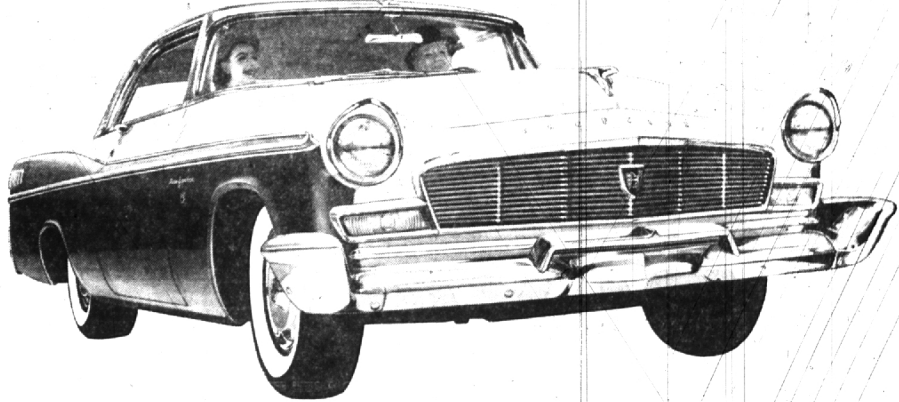

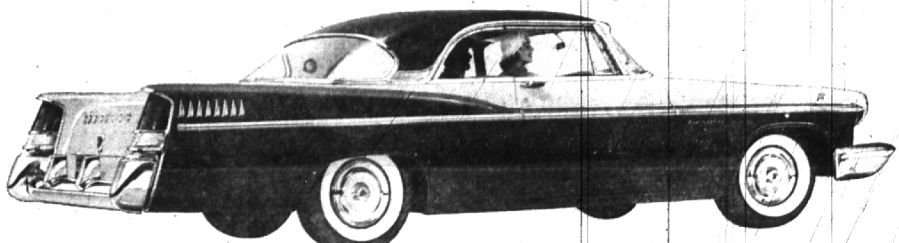
