

Sees Sewer Completion Despite Many Obstacles

An optimistic note was sounded this week on the Evergreen Interceptor sewer by Ralph A. Main, Oakland county drain commissioner.

MAIN'S VIEWS are a far cry from those of Eugene Swem, Southfield township supervisor, who said he is troubled over the plight of the interceptor and that from talking to engineers it appeared to him, Swem, that he was not sure Detroit would take the interceptor flow if and when the project were completed.

Main said it was true that no written commitments had been received from Detroit, and that that had back-peddled on verbal agreements.

Earlier, Main said, a 210-cubic-foot-per-second commitment had been obtained from Detroit. This was broken into the following system: 50, southern; 70, Evergreen Interceptor; 70, Detroit; 10, Evergreen Interceptor; 20, Detroit.

Engineering data would be needed from 7 Mile to Myers road in Detroit to accommodate the Evergreen project, Main said.

HE ALSO affirmed Swem's fears that an inverted siphon under a branch of the Rouge south of 11 Mile would have to be enlarged to accommodate the interceptor.

However, Main said, it would not take five to 10 years to complete as some reports had earlier indicated. It could be done, engineering and all, in three or four months, according to Main. In plenty of time to handle the Evergreen sewer flow.

Written commitments are being sought from Detroit now, Main said.

SHOULD the Evergreen Interceptor sewer project fold, the first step in Southfield would be a sewage treatment about one-half mile south of 14 Mile near Cranbrook road and Rouge river.

Cost, however, would jump from about \$90 per lot under interceptor cost estimated to \$250 per lot. Cost of land purchase would be prohibitive, Main said.

Plans would also be set up along the Rouge river in the Southwestern corner of Southfield township to take up the sewage in the township area now in the Evergreen sewer district and not covered by the Detroit drain plan south of 14 Mile road.

GENERALLY unfavorable publicity seems to be causing confusion and doubt in the minds of Detroit area communities. With the \$2.5 million Evergreen project, which would run with the branches, from 14 Mile to Detroit.

"Regarding election of councilmen, the charter provides that a majority of councilmen will be elected every two years," stated Russell H. Cannon, one of the association's organizers.

"No one group or private interest can control the council under this system," he said. "The city manager has no power over the city clerk or city treasurer and under a two year contract to the council."

HOWARD Palmer, a representative from Beverly Improvement Association, was a special guest invited to the meeting to help organization of the new group.

Tentative organization of the association began last spring when Beverly road became impassable because of mud on both sides of the road. Those living on the Beverly road have a school situation while their neighbors across the street belonged to another.

Future development of Beverly road toward 13 Mile, it is expected by the new association will also be included into the association.

Certificate of approval was received last week from the State Board of Education for the Southfield School board the okay to go ahead with the sale of bonds of the \$7.5 million bond issue.

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Advisory Body Suggests New Procedures

LATHRUP — Earl Hanson and John Oleszewski, two members of a three-man advisory committee on audits and business procedures, told councilmen Monday night that village records were in such better shape than a year ago.

They did, however, suggest a separate bank account for the water department money, and said a better method of keeping track of traffic tickets was needed.
