

## Troy Deals Itself Into New Authority

TROY—Township trustees Monday night approved entrance of the township into a North Evergreen Interceptor Authority and appointed Supervisor Norman E. Barnard its representative.

The four-community authority above 14 Mile road also includes Bloomfield Hills, Birmingham and Bloomfield townships.

The new authority will be used as a substitute for the Evergreen Interceptor authority which stretches to the 8 Mile road and includes Southfield and Lathrup, should the larger authority prove unworkable.

Otherwise it will further aims of the larger project and be ready when the \$1 project is started.

## Ease Restrictions On Parkway Markers

If you have to curb and gutter in front of your house, yet want to mark the edge of the parkway with stones, you can do so under new conditions just set forth by the Birmingham city commission.

The stones must be not more than six inches above ground, nor closer than two feet to the traveled portion of the roadway.

In a companion amendment, the city legalized the placing of leaves along permanent curbs and gutters for pickup by the city's mechanical street sweeper.

## Speech Differences To Be Highlighted At Cranbrook Talk

CRANBROOK—Cranbrook Institute of Science announces the first of a winter series of "Scientific Reports" to be given Oct. 28 at 8:15 in Cranbrook School auditorium. The public is welcome, and no tickets are required.

Speaker is Dr. Philip Lee Smith, Jr., dean of the school of languages, foreign service institute, department of State, who will lecture on the subject of "Speech in the United States" to illustrate his title "Where Are You From?"

"ROUGHLY" says Dr. Smith, the United States is divided into four speech areas—east and west of the Allegheny Mountains, and north and south of the 40th parallel which runs through Philadelphia, Columbus, O. and Springfield, Illinois.

The "r" is often the clue, as in key words like factor, park, car, which point out the New Englander.

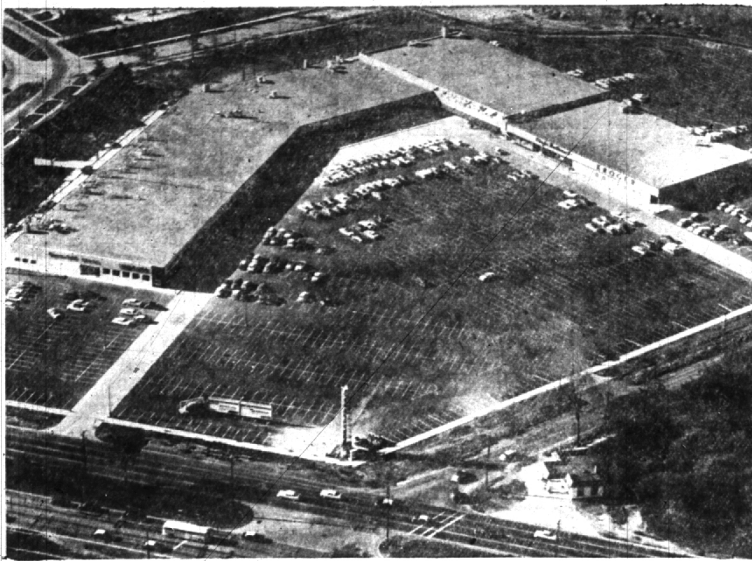
South further states that the differences in vowel regions are due to a combination of historical and geographic factors.
