100 Participants Find Fun, Thrills in Treasure Hunt

When at 7:30 p.m. last Saturday evening, Charles Bay of Quorton road dramatically stepped out on his porch roof and three slips of papers to the crowd waiting below, the area's first big annual treasure hunt was off to a rollicking start.

One hundred people and 16 cars participated in the many, fun-filled quest for the first-car back prize of \$20. Clues or directions, written on slips of paper in forms varying from a few terse words to the Morse code, led the merry crowd over a wide area in a zigzag maze from Gilbert Lake to the Waxton road area.

The first clue, which the treasure hunters had to find in an August issue of a national magazine, led them to an exhibit home on West Maple road. There a sing-song little verse gave them the next step, which befuddled some, while others solved the brain-teaser in a jiffy and blazed away to newer challenges.
