\$100,000 Suit Filed By Birmingham Man

Recommend City Not Sell Site To Athletic Club

Recquet of the Birmingham Athletic Club for a 500 x 500-foot site at the northwest corner of 14 Mile and 4th avenues was not approved at a joint meeting of the city planning and recreation boards Tuesday night.

The planners recommended to the city commission "not to entertain any private sale of the city-owned property in that area, and that it be retained for potential development and use by the recreation board."

It was pointed out that future development of the 64 acres would give the city triangular compactness in its recreation facilities with Springle in the north, Eton in southwest corner and the disclosed area in the southwest corner of the city.

A GROUP of men of the Birmingham Athletic Club offered last July to purchase 5 1/2 acres for an athletic building with tennis and squash courts and locker rooms at an estimated total cost of \$125,000.

The commission referred the matter to the planning board. Recreation board members pointed out this was the largest and actually the last possible area available for future city recreation courts and locker rooms at that location.

Change Accident Reports for All But Minor Collisions

Financial Responsibility Accident reports are now required of all persons who are involved in auto mishaps that damage property in excess of \$100 or cause personal injury.

Act No. 222 of Public Acts of 1955 provides that effective Oct. 14, owners of motor vehicles involved in one of the following type accidents must file the new form, according to Birmingham Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley:

- 1. Fatal accidents.
- 2. Personal injury accidents (no matter how slight).
- 3. Property damage accidents in which damage to any one individual's property is in excess of \$100.

Moxley said new forms would be available at the police complaint desk, or from police in patrol cars.
