

French, British Consuls Speaking Here on Oct. 11

French and British consuls, stationed in Detroit, will speak at the Oct. 11 meeting of the American Association of University Women, held at the Community House, members are inviting husbands to the 8 p.m. program.

The Hon. Jean Belard, France, is a doctor of law and economics. He studied at the Universities of Strasbourg and Paris and the School des Sciences Politiques, in Paris.

He joined the Free French Forces in 1940, was captured, spent 20 months in jail and escaped to join the Allied Forces in N. Africa. He was decorated by both his own and the American governments.

His diplomatic career includes attaché at the French Embassy, Washington, first secretary to the French NATO delegation and deputy head of information for the organization.

Britain's consul, the Hon. Edward H. Moss, was born in China, where his father was in the consular service.

He was graduated from Cambridge and served for six years with the army in the Middle East, taking part in the battle of El Alamein.

Moss has been in the foreign service since 1945, serving in London, Tokyo, Belgrade and the United States.

The men will share a topic, "World Affairs Today" which will be followed by a question and answer period.
