It could not have been said better. But now that it has been said and has happened, what are we going to do about it?

1. Kill weeds with 2-1D or POTASSIUM CYANATE or by cultivating or any other system you prefer.
  - 1 a. Be sure you do it in accordance with the INSTRUCTIONS.
2. One week later rake out the dead patches of weeds.
  - 2 a. Don't rake out the dead areas of grass which were there before killing the weeds because they may not be dead.
3. Fertilize with 2 lbs. of GRO-SOD, STADLER'S XXX or AGRICO TURF to 100 sq. ft.
  - 3 a. Be sure to wash the powder off the grass blades after each one or two spreadfuls.
4. Wait one week. If dead patches don't show signs of grass rake them vigorously with garden rake.
  - 4 a. Sow good grass seed at the rate of:—  
Bare ground—1 lb. to 200 sq. ft.  
Thin lawn—1 lb. to 300 sq. ft.  
Good lawn—1 lb. to 400 sq. ft.
  - 4 b. Use the best seed mixture in which NURSE GRASS (perennial rye, red top or poa trivialis) is not over 20% of the mixture.
  - 4 c. TURFMAKER 67% KY BLUE  
CENTRAL STATES 10% BLUE 30% FESCUE  
MILFORD GREEN 30% BLUE 40% FESCUE
  - 4 d. Cover bare areas with 1/4 inch of PEAT MOSS. (Not necessary but, boy! does it produce results.)
5. Water—once—once a week with one—1—won win inch of water.
6. Now, doesn't it look good?

## 2nd Warning For Removal Of Elm Trees

A second warning has been issued to William F. Dohany of Pontiac, owner of the property at Eton and Lerby in Troy township, by the State Department of Agriculture pertaining to the removal of a large number of diseased Elm trees.

The state department, according to regional director Hubert Kennedy, issued up about 500 tags on the property.

ACCORDING to a tree which has been red-tagged must be removed within 10 days.

More than 20 of the tags were placed on standing trees and many others were put on fallen Elms.

The second warning was given August 25, and through Kennedy's office, court action would be taken after September 4, the expiration of the second 10 days.

MEANWHILE, according to Troy township officials, Dohany has begun removing some of the trees. Early this week workers cut down and burned four trees which had been tested and found to have the disease.

In a conference with township officials, Dohany said he planned on waiting until his trees become more dry later in the Fall, and then he would destroy the trees on the entire parcel.

THE BIRMINGHAM Forestry Department and residents within city limits in the area have shown extreme concern over the situation because of the many elms which have been lost by property owners.
