### Cleveland Judges Kirk Art Entries

Dr. Sherman E. Lee of Cleveland will be looking at a good deal of his hometown art when he arrives to judge entries in the Kirk-in-the-Hills Outdoor Art Festival.

Dr. Lee of the Cleveland Museum of Art will be sole judge of the event, for which Sept. 6 is final deadline for entries. Already he is assured of over six hundred paintings and craftworks according to entry tallies.

AN ESTIMATE that over half of art entries have come from Cleveland and Cleveland Heights for the show according to Mrs. C. H. Robinson, in charge of the craft registrations.

She and Mrs. Phillip Ross, who is in charge of paintings being registered, reported early this week that 61 craftsmen and 545 paintings were entered in time for catalog listings.

Statistics change up to the last minute, according to last year's indications. Then, of the thousand entries from all sections of the United States, only 713 arrived in time for catalog listing.

LAST MINUTE entries and their entry blanks can be accepted until Sept. 6, according to the two registration chairmen.

Numerous awards will go to prizewinners, named by Dr. Lee after he inspects all the entries. All entries will be displayed in the open lakefront grounds about the Kirk in Bloomfield Hills.

The show is on Sept. 15, 16 and 17, and annually attracts national attention. Exhibits will be open to the public from 1 to 7:30 p.m. during the three days, with guided tours of the church set for 2 to 6 p.m. and organ and carillon recitals slated for 4 to 5 p.m. daily.

DR. LEE, CURATOR of oriental art at the Cleveland museum, is considered an outstanding authority on contemporary art, according to Peter J. Robotti, general chairman for the festival.

He is the author of "Chinese Landscape Painting," published in 1954, and co-author with Wen Fong of "Streams and Mountains Without End," published in Astoria, Switzerland, in 1955.

Highpoint of preliminaries of the show will be the patron dinner, being planned by Mrs. Edward S. Wellock and Mrs. Carl J. Snyder. Patrons of the Art Festival, many of whom attend in formal dress, will be previewing the art and craft exhibits before the 7 p.m. dinner.

THE PATRON committee is headed by Mrs. Herbert Mason, with Mrs. Wellock and Mrs. Snyder as her co-chairmen.

Other patrons are Mrs. Carney D. Matheson, Mrs. Arthur B. Wood, Mrs. Roger M. Kyes, and Mrs. Russell Strickland, all of Bloomfield Hills; Mrs. Robotti of Berkeley, and Mrs. John C. Palmer of West Bloomfield township.
