

Families May Send Yuletide Messages To Troops Abroad

Five Birmingham families will have the opportunity of sending personal greetings to sons or daughters serving with the armed forces overseas this year.

The Rev. Emil Kontz, D.D., minister at First Baptist church, has been asked by Mrs. P. L. Thompson of Pontiac's WCAR to contact five families for this privilege.

"It's a case of first come, first served," he said. "I will accept the first five calls received either at my home or at my office. It's really a splendid opportunity for these people to take Christmas to those boys and girls who can't come home."

He asked that contacts be made immediately, since transcription must be done as soon as possible. The date of the recordings has been set for Sept. 18, from 2-3:30 p.m.

"There will be no charge for these messages," Dr. Kontz emphasized. "They will be carried to overseas bases by the facilities of WCAR and International Shortwave Radio."

County Red Cross Flood Aid Quota Set at \$13,320

Sharp rises in flood damages to six western states has resulted in the Oakland county American Red Cross chapter in the form of a request for \$13,320 from this area.

Mrs. Mildred Bennett, executive secretary, said latest reports list 10,952 needy families, with the national Red Cross being asked to contribute \$8,000,000 for their assistance.

"There are more than seven hundred homes completely wrecked," she said, "and thousands more damaged."

"While federal aid is being poured into the area, it is as President Eisenhower explained, earmarked for public and commercial aid rather than to individuals and families."

"The Red Cross is the only source of immediate help to those persons in getting them properly clothed, fed and housed again."

"Our president asked that the public flood the Red Cross with more money than we could possibly need. That, while a large order, would be one of the happiest moments of our lives."

Mrs. Bennett said any contributions were to be mailed to the county office, 138 Franklin boulevard, Pontiac.

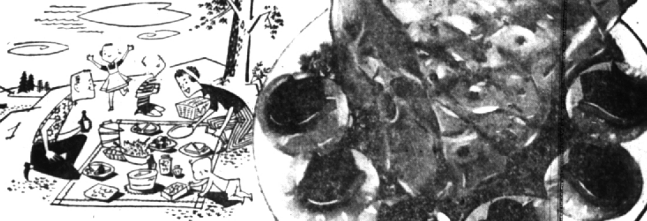
