**Engineer 'Plans' Good Garden**

 Recently I visited the home of Harry M. Denyes, 608 Oak, which truly expresses the interests of the occupants.  
 Mrs. Denyes is well known for her ability in the field of interior decorating while Denyes is an engineer, known as "Mr. Steering Gear" among the pioneers in the automotive field. He also has an ardent enthusiasm for garden design.  
 With the manner of an engineer Denyes explained, "I laid out the pattern I desired on paper, and at that time selected the plant material to best execute the drawing."  
 No doubt you had admired their home with its wide circular driveway, flanking the home is a generous use of yews, euonymus, red hollyhock. During the summer large white tulips filled with pink geraniums flank the steps.  
 NEXT TO THE sidewalk and between two white brick pillars which mark the inside circle of the drive, is a hedge of arborvitae, maintained at four and one-half feet. On the side of the hedge, facing the front door, is a solid planting of white petunias.  
 As you proceed around to the rear garden you are captivated by the large screened porch with bamboo furniture which faces east, so shady in the afternoon.  
 Back of the house is a collection of evergreens near the home foundation. Where a pipe or wire is to be covered a columnar evergreen is planted. Under two adjoining windows there are flat growing evergreens to stretch the horizontal line and bring down the height of the house. If an awkward architectural line

exists an evergreen is chosen to cover the shortcoming.  
 THE FOCAL point in the yard is a large mat apple tree. Behind it is a circular terrace, about 20 feet in diameter, on which are several pieces of casual white furniture with yellow canvas to catch the breeze. The area is reached from the house by a curved walk of stepping stones.  
 Around the border of the property shrubs have been allowed to grow expressing their natural grace in front of some of a private hedge which covers up the ragged grass apt to need constant care at the base of mature shrubs. In front of this secondary hedge is a generous flower border which boasts a constantly changing summer cycle.  
 In August the many phlox varieties were brilliant. The abundant use of white plants gave style to the design providing a contrast against the mature shrubs.  
 THIS GOOD gardener likes to supplement his ground fertilizing program with fertilizer soluble in a "sprinkling can, used for choice plants."  
 In the flower border Denyes has his plants in masses. You will find as you visit gardens that those flower beds you admire the most use this technique.  
 Outside the kitchen and porch door is an intimate garden made of flanking stems approximately 14 by 12 feet which has pink metal furniture.  
 THERE IS A white dogwood tree along the boundary planting, 20 feet high, the potential you may expect from most ornamental trees. Under it Denyes has planted yellow daffodils and myrtle which has blue flowers.  
 Near the back of the property is an L-shape stakeade fence about six and one-half feet high and 12 by 8 feet and slanted with creosote. Behind this one-hedge is kept the tools and equipment for gardening.  
 Along the back line of shrubs is a four foot rustic fence 17 feet from the property line. This is placed to cover up and avoid maintenance in front of shrubs. It provides an intimate effect to this coordinated, well planned garden.  
 An American arbutus hedge 12 feet high and 25 feet long hides the cutting garden.  
 In your own garden you can develop such a place of charm if you first have a picture of what you want then select plant material "paint" the design for you.
