Army Warns Merchants of Mock Checks

Michigan Military District issued a warning to all merchants to be cautious of any attempts to cash imitation Army reserve checks. These imitation checks, approximately \$2,000 in number, were sent statewide to all inactive reservists as a part of a mailing campaign designed to boost participation in active Army reserve units.

Reports have been received that several attempts to cash these checks have been made. The checks range from \$254.97 to \$2,000 and are representative of one (1) year's Army reserve training pay an individual would receive had he been active in the Army reserve program.

THE DESCRIPTION of the check is as follows: 3 1/2" x 7 1/2" in the upper right corner is an eagle with the words "Army Reserve, Michigan Military District"; immediately beneath this is the representative dollar for one (1) year's Army Reserve unit training pay; Check No. 024567; signed by A. Haggis, Capt., Headquarters Michigan Military District, Pitts. Wayne, 6301 W. Jefferson, Detroit 17, Michigan.

The word "CANCELLED" is on the left portion of the check in 1/2" black block letters across the front of the check and above the checks are dated 22 August 1935.

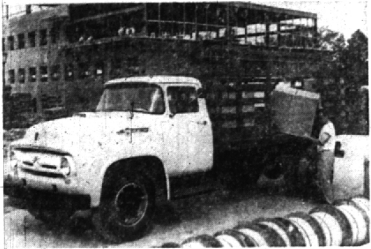
Seeburger Attends Chiropodists Meet

Second hour will be devoted to swimming. Life saving methods with showers and maintaining order in the pool room and corridors.

Brent Hogshead, 1519 Henrietta, again will receive chairman of the adult service committee, which renders assistance to instructors by checking scouts, their work with showers and maintaining order in the pool room and corridors.

EACH room is expected to share responsibilities of this committee. An assignment schedule will be mailed to each troop.

Additional instructors are needed. Those interested should report to the pool Oct. 4.

Scouts must bring unit identification cards at the pool's entrance and must bring towel and soap for each swim.
