To Reduce Size of Sewer Project

Size of a relief sewer for an outside neighborhood was reduced this week as the city commission continued the hearing until Oct. 3. Residents in the Knox-Worth street area objected to proposed relief and storm sewers, claiming they were not needed. Commission decided short new sewers on Maple and south end of Worth would temporarily relieve several flooded basements there, and directed the project be re-directed on that basis.

Willetts Widening Up for Hearing

Widening of Willetts west of Woodward will be considered at an Oct. 3 hearing by the Birmingham city commission. Proposed plans call for widening 10 feet on the north, between Woodward and the curve, with 5 feet on both sides at the Raye intersection. Subsequent city hearings would concern paving and possible further improvement of the alley between Willetts and W. Maple.

World Peace To Key Talk By Britisher

Isaac James Pitman, member of Britain's Parliament and chairman for a publishing firm of educational books, will speak on "Peace—the 64 Billion Dollar Question" at Community House tomorrow night at 8 p.m.

Pitman, whose talk is sponsored by the United World Federalists' Oakland County chapter, will be introduced by Brig. Gen. S. L. A. Marshall, military news analyst for the Detroit News.

ASPECTS of peace and disarmament will be main topics. Pitman, whose grandfather was Isaac Pitman, founder of the shorthand system of the same name, is a Conservative from Bath, England, and has been in Parliament since 1948.

Besides chairmanship and membership of Sir Isaac Pitman & Sons, Ltd., publishing firm, he is a director of Boots Pure Drug Co. and a governor of the British Film Institute.

ACTIVE IN educational work and British charities and a former director of the Bank of England, he is 54 years old, and attended Oxford. During World War II he served as acting squadron leader in the Royal Air Force.
