(Continued from Page 1. Sec. 1) "If they come," says Labadie, who has fished the Big Manistee for more than 30 years.

**BACK IN 1947** he caught a 21 and 5/8 pound bow, the largest ever taken on the Big Manistee, and, modestly boasting, "it was the largest rainbow caught east of the Rocky Mountains, as entered in Field & Stream magazine's contest that year."

"To be sure, one doesn't fish for trout (as well as many other species of fish) merely for food. As most anglers admit, if it all we want is food, it would be much cheaper to buy fish at the nearest market."

Only those who love to fish, and do so with some annual regularity, know the therapeutic value of being on a lake or river, engaged in the primitive business of fishing.

NO TELEPHONES are at hand. The hurry of business is left behind. There is no traffic rush or danger of highway accident.

One's thoughts are 100 per cent concentrated on the fishing at hand... and after a long day thusly engaged, one's appetite becomes a hungry demand, and no slice is any sweeter or more restful than that which follows a day of hard work.

Right now, along this great Manistee River, the leaves of the hardwoods are turning from green to yellow, brown and red, along the river's edge today we passed a beautiful maple whose leaves were a brilliant scarlet.

THESE AREN'T very many evergreen trees in this part of Michigan. Indeed, I am told that there were once as many pine as in the eastern half of the State.

The Big Manistee, the Jordan, Pere, Marquette, Muskegon and other waterways transported for the most part maples, oaks, elms and kindred hardwoods.

The Big Manistee is a mighty flow of water. Starting near Orsego, in the north-central part of the Lower Peninsula, it wanders westward for several hundred winding miles, finally emptying into Lake Michigan at the city of Manistee.

A few miles east of Wellston (which town is six miles north of our cabin) is the Tippy Dam, a Consumers Power hydroelectric project, on the Manistee River.

IT IS WEST of this Dam that rainbow fishing is done each fall and anglers come from many States to pit their skill against these strong, leaping trout.

Having, late this summer, completed an 8,700 mile automobile trip through Alberta, Canada, and our own far western States, during which time I did some fishing, I still love out-of-doors Michigan.

Two more days of rainbow fishing on the Big Manistee await Jack Taylor and me. We hope to catch more of these beautiful progeny of the cold waters... and all the time we are enjoying all those wonderfully restful by-products that are collateral to the recreation of angling.

AMONG THE many instances that are reward for belonging to the family of mankind, and for which I join countless other millions of grateful souls, is the gentle art made famous by the works of beloved Isaac Walton!

"...any luck", or "...how they come!" (P.S. You will not get that I have not written about... that big one that got away!... much as I'd like to, too.)

P.S.: You will note that I have second two days of this fishing, Taylor and I had each obtained one limit (10 lbs. and one fish per person.)
