Camping Reduces Epileptic Seizures Kappas Are Told

"Epileptic children actually have fewer seizures at camp Cryle than they do at home," Mrs. Frank Cryle told members of Kappa Kappa Gamma alumnae at a luncheon meet at Mrs. Chester Bowler's Wesley drive home Tuesday afternoon.

The camp, which the alumnae support, gives youngsters camp experience who are barred from all other camps because of epilepsy. Mrs. Cryle told of one boy who averaged four seizures a day at home but had none at all in his two weeks at camp.

SHE AND MRS. Marguerite Steffy, also on the board of Michigan Society for Epileptic children, stressed that epilepsy should have no more stigma attached than to heart attacks or rheumatoid fever.

They pointed out that it is caused by brain injuries or outside injuries, with a tendency towards being inherited. "New medicine can now highly control it and prevent seizures," Mrs. Cryle said.
