The Birmingham Y's Men will entertain their wives and fellow members with a magical show on Monday in the Dr. Ormond Lounge of the Birmingham YMCA.

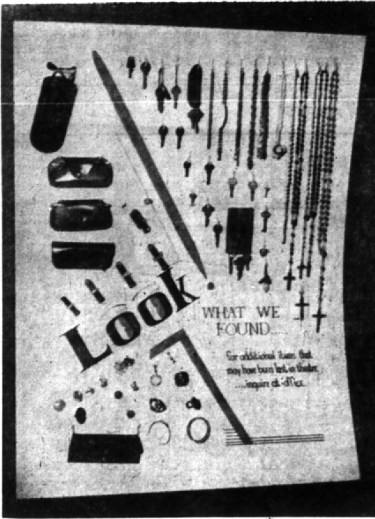

Drive, Alley Costs Are Determined

If developer Albert Nelson will deposit \$24,975 with the city treasurer, Birmingham will proceed to have access drives and an alley constructed for a group of new stores at 14 Mile and Southfield. The city will only pay 25 per cent of the \$3,900 alley cost. It owns a well site immediately north of the commercial area.

A parking ticket is the worst you ever expect from the police—so you'd hardly know what to do if arrested. Sure, I'm a law-abiding citizen and go to church every Sunday. I never intend to tangle with the police. They have a tough job, and I've never yet met the one that I felt was overpaid; but I'm willing to let policemen perform their services on somebody else's Let's suppose, though, that a policeman did come to arrest me—or you—on a serious charge. I don't know about you, but I'd certainly be puzzled as to what to do!

I'VE READ all about how the constitution guarantees me "civil rights," but I'd sure want someone in my corner—right away—who knows the ins and outs of law and what I should or shouldn't do. At the very beginning, though, I'd have to go it alone.

So, first off, I'd want to know that policeman had good reasons for arresting me, and I'd ask to see his warrant for my arrest. He would have to have one unless he had all but caught me red-handed, and he would have to show it to me within a reasonable time. That much I know. Then, I guess I'd go along peacefully; not happily, but peacefully.

I KNOW I've got those "civil rights" that start from the time the policeman first appears, and if necessary—follow me right through to the supreme court. But I'd want to take full advantage of every one of those guarantees.

We all know that we can't legally be forced to answer any questions or sign any papers, that we have a right to a prompt court hearing, and that we are entitled to apply for bail.

We know these principles from our history books, at least, just like I know in a vague sort of way that American law assures me that I'm entitled to learn the exact charges that are against me, and to have a copy of the formal charges in writing.

IT'S ONE thing to know that I possess these rights, but it's a new occurrence when criminal courts have a serious miscarriage of justice, and that policemen are inept citizens earning a livelihood the hard way, with no authority or desire to harass the innocent.

It's something else to know exactly what course to take when you run smack into the law. That's when I'd call for help and secure the peace of mind that goes with being certain of a "fair shake."

Yes, sir, if a policeman came for

me and had a warrant with my name on it, I wouldn't give him a hard time, because he has a legal order to arrest me.

HE WOULDN'T have that warrant unless some judge or justice of the peace had been convinced by a person with firsthand information, on a signed complaint, that there was good reason to believe I had committed a certain criminal act.

Or, perhaps, a grand jury had worked my case over and found enough reason for an indictment. A warrant as a rule isn't easily come by.

Even without a warrant, a police officer could legally arrest me if he had reasonable grounds to believe I had committed a serious crime, or was attempting to commit one.

ALTHOUGH I knew a cop was doing wrong—that I was 100 per cent in the clear—I wouldn't pull any funny stuff. Sure, I'm entitled to argue my case, but I'd want to be sure of false arrest, but again I'd want some straight advice, for chances are that almost any well-trained police officer could offer pretty strong proof that he had reasonable grounds for his action.

Something else I figured out the other day, too. With chances being that the police officer knows when he's making a lawful arrest, I could be completely innocent of the charge he was arresting me for. But if I started a hassle, I could suddenly become as guilty as you, or even what of a second crime, that of resisting an officer.

Yes, I'll go quietly. Then, with my lawyer beside me, I'll let those American civil rights go to work.

3 Cities Report Good Percentage On Tax Payments

With Birmingham leading in tax levies and percentages collected before the Sept. 1 penalty date, Bessemer Hills and Lathrop also report good returns.

Birmingham's levy of \$1,140,000 was \$92,245.19 paid by Aug. 31, a 94.69 per cent return. Figures last year showed collections amounted to 94.21 per cent.

In Bessemer Hills returns were reported as "a bit higher than last year." The levy there was \$124,068, with \$102,560.60, or 83 per cent, paid by Aug. 31.

Lathrop's levy amounted to \$45,521.74, and by Aug. 31, 84 per cent, or \$38,256.30, had been paid.

Beginning Sept. 1 a three-quarter of one per cent per month penalty is applied to all unpaid taxes, continuing to March 1 when delinquents are turned over to the county treasurer.

Birmingham taxpayers in their December tax bills will see an extra \$13,312.36 to the city's fund for county drain-at-large assessments.

This was determined this week when commissioners authorized collection of one-half a mill for county drains, compared to one-quarter mill levied each year since 1950.

Principal reason for the double amount this year, according to City Manager D. C. Ebert, is because the city is among those involved in the 12-Town drains, which is in the engineering drawing stage.

Birmingham's ultimate share of the 12-Town, Ebert estimates, probably will be in excess of \$500,000.
