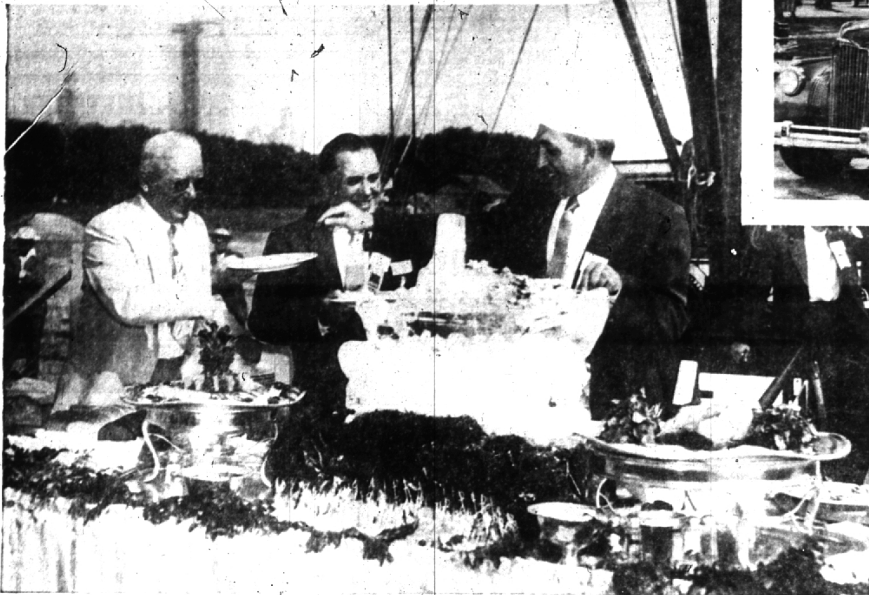
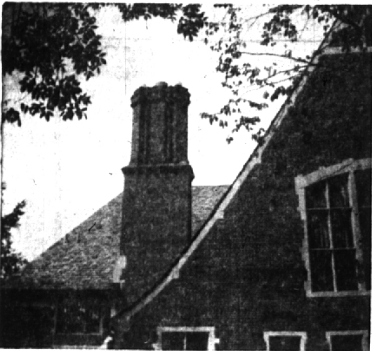

Considerable Contrast

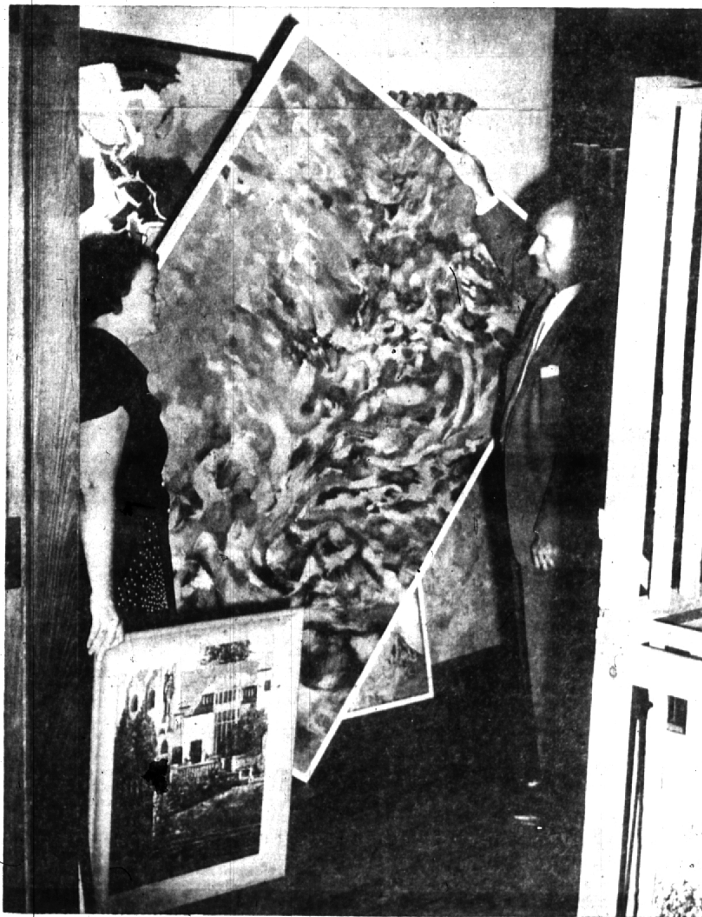
