Jr. Achievement Plans 8-Company Program in B'ham

Seven local concerns have pledged sponsorship to date for Junior Achievement companies to be operated by Birmingham teenagers.

Walter L. Fleming, executive director of Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan, Inc., said an eight-company operation is planned for Birmingham JA this year.

Each JA company will be sponsored by an established business or industrial concern, and the responsibility for organizing and operating the miniature firms will be in the hands of teenagers. Each firm will have a team of three volunteer executives from the sponsor concern to advise it in problems of management, sales and production.

CONCERNS that have already arranged to sponsor are: Advertising Multigraph Corporation; Birmingham National Bank; Swedish Crucible Steel Co.; Lockers, Inc.; Dodge Div., Chrysler Corp.; Ford Motor Co.; Tractor and Implement Division and The Birmingham Eccentric.

In all, teenagers are expected to found and operate 300 JA firms in Southeastern Michigan when the program opens in mid-October. Boys and girls will be able to apply for JA membership in September when assemblies will be held in local high schools. They will operate throughout the school year until Mid-May when all the firms will be liquidated. Birmingham JA firms most of the organization's business center located in the basement of the Birmingham Theater building.
