Don't Go Along With Discourteous Highway Crowd

"Courtesy is the keynote on crowded highways," declares L. D. Rahilly, president of the Michigan Trucking Association. "Experience indicates the heavier the traffic, the less drivers tend to extend courtesy of the road to each other. Traffic may bog down completely and accidents often result. This vicious circle can be broken only by the individual efforts of every driver to give the other driver a fair break," Rahilly emphasized.

RAHILLY pointed out that the driving public includes persons with widely-varying degrees of skill. Many drivers, because of lack of experience, poor judgment, or carelessness, may make mistakes which can turn into tragedy. He said this can be prevented by the alertness of courteous, defensive drivers, who take the proper steps to avoid an accident. Rahilly stated: "Many drivers misjudge safe passing distance, particularly at higher speeds. An accident can be avoided if the driver being passed, or the first oncoming driver, will slow down. "In extreme cases, they should pull off onto the shoulder. This defensive action is just one way to prevent accidents. "No matter how good a road system developed in the years to come, it will be a waste of your money and mine if the roads are not used properly."

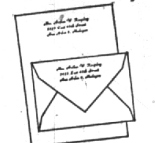
YMCA Sponsors Three-Day Visit To Washington

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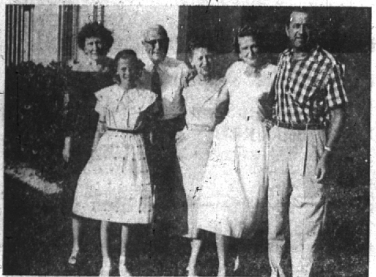


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Visited in Ft. Lauderdale
