Humming sewing machines are turning out 35 brand new children's outfits at the homes of members of St. James Episcopal church's St. Catherine guild.

Everything will be brand new when 25 youngsters model their mothers' handiwork in the "Do-it-yourself" fashion show scheduled at the church next Thursday, April 19. The show will be held in connection with a dessert bridge party at 1 p.m.

"Do-it-yourself" has been chosen as the show's theme because, as Mrs. Lawrence A. Smith, chairman, puts it, "That's the popular trend."

Asked to what she attributed the trend, Mrs. Smith commented that "with larger families and the high cost of children's clothes, many mothers like those in St. Catherine's guild are resorting to sewing in order to keep their children looking neat."

Local Unitarians See Installation At Farmington

The six Unitarian and Universalist churches of the Detroit metropolitan area, including the Birmingham Unitarian fellowship, joined Sunday in the installation of the Rev. Walter E. Kellison as minister of Farmington Universalist church.

Mr. Kellison succeeds the Rev. Russell L. Lincoln, now of Birmingham. He has had a wide experience in the liberal movement. For the last six years he has been state superintendent of Universalist churches in Maine.

Mr. Kellison becomes the 16th pastor of the Farmington church, which celebrated its centennial in 1953. The first was the Rev. E. M. Woolley, who preached also in Birmingham, where he made his home after bringing his family to Michigan from the Finger Lakes area of New York state.

Rev. Blackburn To Be Installed At Kirk in Hills

A native of Pennsylvania, Dr. Blackburn comes to the Kirk from Willard, O., where he has been minister of the First Presbyterian church.

He is a graduate of Grove City college, Princeton theological seminary, Omaha seminary, and McCormick seminary. He was ordained a minister of the Presbyterian church at Pittsburgh in 1936.

HIS OTHER PASTORATES have included Seward, Nebraska; Ada, O.; Forest Hills in Pittsburgh, and Canton, O., where he was associate minister.

Dr. Blackburn is married and has two children.

The Rev. Harold C. DeWindle, D.D., is minister of the Kirk in the Hills.
