

Survey Spot-Checks Knowledge of Cancer

How much does the average woman know about cancer? That's the question a nationwide American Cancer society survey is seeking to answer, through the efforts of women in thousands of American communities, like Mrs. John K. Bagby, of 972 Oxford, Birmingham.

Proceeding this week's showings of the free film, "Breast Self-Examination," in cities across the nation, survey directors assigned women like Mrs. Bagby specific neighborhoods to spot-check.

"I WAS TOLD to visit certain streets and question one woman in every other house," Mrs. Bagby said.

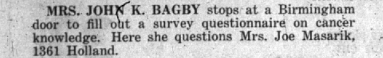
A follow-up questioning of a cross-section of the nation's women will come after the showings, to determine the effectiveness of this month's concentrated educational program on cancer.

Mrs. Bagby is women's committee chairman for the south Oakland county unit of the American Cancer society.

Educational measures which the south Oakland unit is fighting cancer include a 27-minute film on the subject, Mrs. Bagby explained.

THE FILM AND a speaker to answer questions for groups, she said, are available through Mrs. E. T. Hearne, educational director of the American Cancer society unit at 610 N. Main street, Royal Oak.

Future plans call for a separate Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills unit of the society, because "a small group can do a better job of bringing information to the community," Mrs. Bagby said.
