Franklin Community Association Completes Plans for Spring Dance

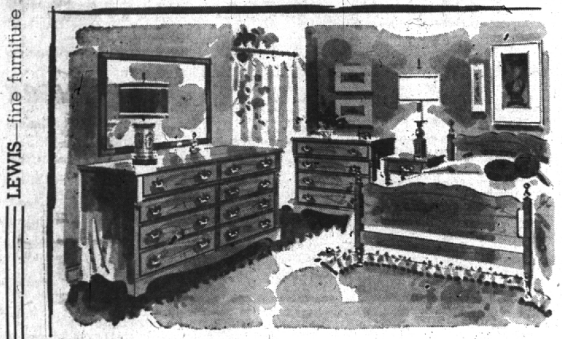

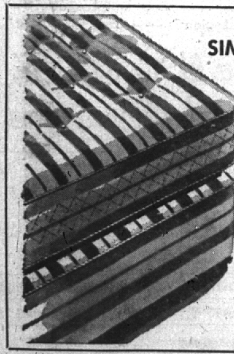

ONE QUESTION in particular from a member of the audience, drew reaction from two sides. Council was asked why, if there was so much pressure from State Officials for an end of pollution in the area, was continued banding allowed.

City Attorney Everett F. Hayes said he feared that such a question would eventually be voiced. Charles D. Kelley, subdivision, defended the continuance of home construction. One councilman was quoted after the meeting as saying he had asked the question before, too, and had never been given a satisfactory answer. The question came near the end of a rather stormy meeting.

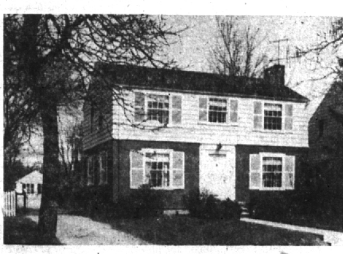

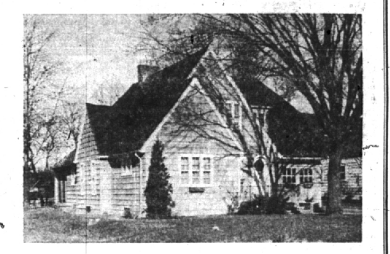
