Expect Detroit Horse Show To Be Biggest in History

The 39th annual Detroit Horse Show—America's largest outdoor horse show—will be larger than ever when it opens for a five-day run June 20 at Bloomfield Open Hunt Club, East Long Lake Road, Bloomfield Hills.

The 1956 show dates were announced by Irving A. Duffy, chairman, and William O. Bridge, co-chairman.

Duffy, show chairman for the third year, said growing interest in horse shows has prompted the sponsors to increase the number of classes from 82 to 96, and to schedule 12 events during the five days of the show.

HE POINTED out that the 1955 Detroit Horse Show attracted more than 50,000 spectators during its four-day run.

"We have added classes and programs in an effort to meet the demands of exhibitors and spectators," Mr. Duffy said. "There were over 320 horses entered in the Detroit show last year, and all indications point to at least a ten per cent increase for 1956."

The Detroit Horse Show, accredited as a Class A show by the American Horse Shows Association, will draw entries from Jumpers, Hunters, and Western-in-

addition, junior riders will compete throughout the United States and Canada in three major divisions—during all five days of the show.

SHOW manager Bert McIntire said prize money will total more than \$10,000, including six stakes classes—two worth \$1,000 and two worth \$500 each in the Hunter Division, a \$1,000 stake in the Jumper Division, and a \$200 stake in the Western Division.

Famous ringmaster Clarence L. "Honey" Craven of Boston, Mass., will preside at the Detroit show again this year. Craven has been ringmaster for the Detroit show for the past 27 years, and also officiated at other leading horse shows throughout the United States, including the American Royal at Madison Square Garden, New York.

Mrs. E. E. Fisher and Miss Charlotte Niebel, co-secretaries of the Detroit Horse Show, said entries forms are now being mailed to exhibitors.
