## THE BACKYARD DOPE

"HOW DO YOU LIKE YOUR FRUIT, WORMY?"

Half a loaf may be better than no loaf at all but it seems certain that half a WORM is worse than no worm at all . . . that is, unless you are that little lonesome boy who went into the garden to eat worms and yesterday ate two smooth ones and one woolly one.

Now here's the dope:—

1. Use a good all purpose FRUIT TREE SPRAY such as DUPONT'S or ORTHO'S or BONIDE'S. (Individual items in the mixture are available for trees with 30 or more people.)

2. Make up a fresh solution for each application. (Insecticides grow less effective with age as do you.)

3. After each spraying discard the remainder (this is not true of martini olives) and clean the equipment thoroughly.

4. Keep agitated while spraying. No, Junior, it means "keep the mixture agitated. What? Well, of course, if you drank the stuff you would have to jump around a little."

5. Spray EVERY WEEK, rain or shine, beginning when the leaf buds open and continuing up to 7 to 15 days before harvest. BE SURE to cover the UNDER side as well as the TOP side of all leaves.

DO NOT SPRAY DURING FULL BLOOM.

The TOP CENTER of each tree must be WELL COVERED.

6. A curious note. Before bloom on apples and on half-grown stone fruits the spray is more effective against diseases if applied just before a rain. The insecticidal effect is most effective if applied just before a hot spell.

7. A note for 'ye pore pruner'. Spraying results will be disappointing unless trees are pruned to:—

- Thin out thick growth.
- Remove dead and weak wood.
- Cut trees back to 20 feet or lower.
- Train trees to no more than 18 feet.

Since our own trees are about 35 feet high we are going to quit spraying and try to raise some red-banded leaf rollers. If there is a market for Godfrey's Zovzia plugs there MUST be a market for RED-BANDED LEAF ROLLERS.

Well, leave us get along to more important stuff.

6. Acidantha. The unsophisticated will be happier when they realize that the flowers from these bulbs are really PEACOCK ORCHIDS . . . 75c A DOZEN.
7. Calla Lily . . . \$3.95 a doz.
