Annual Meeting of Protective Association Set for May 14

Annual meeting of the Bloomfield Village Protective Association will be Monday, May 14, in the all purpose room of Bloomfield Village school, at 8 p.m. Election of officers and reports on Village activities are on the agenda.

One trustee from each of the three districts in the Village will be elected to replace three retiring trustees, Joseph Baldez, Palmer Bollinger and Gordon Degener.

Candidates nominated are: Read Jenkins, 927 Cranbrook road and Nelson A. Miles, 265 Westwood for district 1; Louis A. Bauer, 2140 Broadway Blvd. and Arch E. Stevenson, 204 Williamsburg road, district 2; and Blaine Eymann, 520 Half Moon road and Sylvester F. Leahy, 600 Hupp Cross road, district 3.

Any other member may be nominated for the board by a petition signed by not less than 10 per cent of the membership and the petition shall be filed with Arthur F. Brookman, association secretary five days prior to the annual meeting.

Harry B. Cunningham, road commissioner, has been inspecting roads in the village and reports roads came through the winter in excellent shape. Oakland county road commission has been asked to come into the village to do the repair work on the pot-holes that have appeared.

Cunningham has noted considerable loose gravel and leaves in the gutters. He suggests that if each property owner will remove loose gravel and debris, the appearance of the streets will be greatly improved and sewers will be more efficient during heavy spring rains.

Elm trees are now being sprayed to control the Dutch Elm disease. It has been brought to the attention of the association that the spray might have some effect on the bird life and the association has asked state agencies to investigate the matter.

Morris C. Purdy, fire commissioner reports the new truck was delivered to Battle Creek to have the body and complete fittings assembled. Delivery is expected by midsummer. The new truck will give Bloomfield Village more complete fire protection.

According to Barney D. Bannan, police commissioner, policemen have reported several homes in the village which do not have street numbers and some that are illegible. This can be serious, Bannan pointed out, if an emergency arises and the address cannot be found.
