Joint Lake Property Owners Presents Lake Safety Rules

Prevention of accidents on the lake is the purpose of a set of "Rules of Safety and Etiquette" drawn up by the joint Lake Property Owners council of Walnut Lake and soon to be distributed to Walnut Lake residents.

The joint council is an outgrowth of an open meeting held last November, at which property owners from all parts of the Walnut Lake area expressed a desire to cooperate on lake problems and a belief that the time to do something about accidents is before they happen.

The resulting joint council met April 19 at the home of its chairman, Julian Offenstein, of Sub 3. Present were Mrs. Jack Bek of Sub 2; secretary, Jim Sevik, representing Sub 1; Harry Board, Sub 2; William Lutz, Sub 3; R. C. Banker representing property owners at the south end of the lake and Robert G. Meyers representing the west side.

Other members are Claude Whitmer of Sub 1 and E. A. Freund, who represents the north end of the lake. After reviewing the work of its previous meetings, the council decided to send copies of the rules to all property owners using the lake and to post the rules in public locations.

In addition, each member will contact those living in his section. Also discussed were the new bills now before the Senate, governing the use of inland lakes, and the present law as defined by the attorney general, Jim Sevik, deputy sheriff, will patrol the lake this year and is to have access to a boat at each end of the lake.

Safety rules suggested by the joint council constitute a gentleman's agreement outlining good manners and proper conduct for those using the lake. They are designed to lessen the possibility of accidents while permitting enjoyment of the lake by swimmers, fishermen and boaters alike.
