Southern Oakland Girl Scouts, one of the youth training services made possible by the Torch drive, will be represented at the senior girl scout roundup by three troops of eight girls each.

Those who will comprise the patrols have been named, along with four alternates.

June 29 through July 11 are the roundup dates and the place will be Highland recreation area, west of Pontiac.

Patrol 25 is being trained by Mrs. Harold W. Longyear, W. Long Lake road, Bloomfield Hills. Mary Roberts, Lakeshire road, Birmingham is patrol leader.

MEMBERS who live in Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills are Margaret Roberts, Sally Hansen, Kay M. Graber, Barbara Hansen, Pat Johnson and Sylvia Longyear. Alternates are Valeria French and Susy Brown, both of Bloomfield Hills.

Patrol 26 is made up of Berkeley, Farmington and Livonia scouts. Mrs. Harry Tuckfield, Norwood drive, Southfield township, is training the group. She is assisted by Mrs. Theodore Welch, Aberdeen road, Southfield township.

Patrol 27 is made up of girls from Berkeley, Ferndale, Royal Oak and Birmingham. Patricia Cattell is the Birmingham member.

DELEGATES were selected from senior scouts in each district because of ability to work with others, an appreciation of differences, acceptance of responsibility and love of company, scout officials report.

Considerable advance training is

necessary, they pointed out, because the roundup will be strictly a primitive troop camp. Patrols will bring their own camping equipment, pitch and strike their own tents, establish their campsites and cook their own meals over charcoal.

Three big programs will be produced in an outdoor amphitheater. The public will be invited to these.

WOODED AREAS and open fields are included in the camp site, as are a wildlife sanctuary, nature and hiking trails. There is a small waterfront that can be used for swimming.

"Americana" is the roundup theme and three goals have been

announced. It is hoped that the girls will develop: First, an awareness of our national heritage; second, an understanding of that culture's effect on current issues in community and nation; third, greater consideration and respect for others, plus a realization of democratic human relations.

DELEGATES will exchange songs, dances, crafts and customs of their respective communities. Time will be provided for girls to make friends with others from all parts of the country.

Campfire meetings and other gatherings are planned for the entire encampment.

Selling Textiles To Benefit Student Scholarship Fund

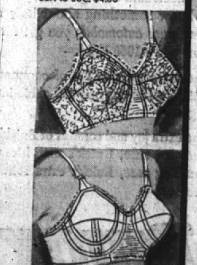
Saturday and Sunday will be the last two days of the one-woman show of Marianne Strenge textiles, now exhibiting at Cranbrook academy art galleries.
