

Experts List Causes for Delinquency

Lead a good, clean, moral life, and stay married, if you want to be a good parent.

Those two points were emphasized last week by Judge Nathan J. Kaufman, of the juvenile division of Wayne county probate court, and Judge Arthur E. Moore, of the juvenile division of Oakland county probate court.

Approximately 75 per cent of the cases that come from broken homes," Judge Kaufman told a group of listening city panel discussion on juvenile delinquency sponsored by Birmingham's Y's Men's club.

"I BELIEVE the day will come when the teaching of a code of morals for family living and good mental hygiene," said Judge Moore, "will be set upon as the most important thing to be taught in the public schools."

"Teaching the benefit of morals in family life," Judge Moore said, "would be better than mathematics or Greek."

'Cyclist Caught By Hills Police After Wild Chase

He wore a black leather jacket and goggles on his motorcycle as he sped down Woodward Saturday, and he thought he could elude Hills police. The cyclist was caught after a wild chase that lasted for 15 minutes.

Result was a 110-115 mile per hour chase that "went on for 15 minutes," said Judge Alva P. Richardson Monday. He was fined \$100 plus \$16 costs, sentenced to 15 days in the county jail, and deprived of his driver's license for 30 days.

PATROLMAN Robert Brown, driver of the police car, reported that Green pulled his motorcycle across the Woodward avenue parkway near Opdyke and sped toward Postle when he first followed him over for speeding.

Brown gave chase, following the cyclist onto eastbound Square Lake road, where he pulled alongside at Opdyke and again ordered him to stop. The cyclist slammed on the brake, turned behind the police car, and headed north on Opdyke at speeds of 110 to 115 miles per hour.

When Patrolman Brown caught up with him this time, he forced him off the road, slowing the cycle. Green then began circling tactics, looking for a chance to dodge behind the police car once more.

PATROLMAN WALTER CARR, riding with Brown, had been ignored when he pointed a gun at the speeder, and even when he fired three shots over Green's head.

Brown finally stopped him by turning into the cycle and throwing Green to the ground. "If I hadn't done it," Brown said, "things could have gone on all night."

Police Chief Stanley Kevern said Green is being encouraged to sell his motorcycle.

3 Police Officers Begin 90 Hours' Further Training

Joining over 50 other area police officers, three members of the Birmingham police force last week began a 90-hour course on additional training.

The three are Frank Stubblefield, Clayton Armitage, and Douglas Noble.

Birmingham Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said the Royal Oak school at which he is an instructor, is sponsored by the Southeastern Michigan Police Chiefs' association, in cooperation with the FBI.

Police from Clawson, Troy township, Royal Oak, Bloomfield township, Waterford township, and other southeastern Michigan communities will continue the training, along with their regular duties, for a period of 18 months.

Agreeing with Judge Moore, Justice Kaufman said that outside of the time a child sleeps, he is in school more of the time than he is at home.

"THE TEACHER should be in the same position as the parents during those hours, the Detroit judge said. "So the instructor can do what he or she feels a good parent would do when his child misbehaves."

In his talk preceding the question period, Judge Kaufman blamed specialization and the faster pace of the auto age for many juveniles' problems.

"Because this is an age of specialists, many parents feel they can't do the job themselves. They send junior to a psychiatrist instead of trying to do a job as parents."

Tracking a suspicious-looking car led Birmingham police to apprehension of a youth who Monday was fined \$25 and \$5 costs or ten days in jail after admitting the theft of three hub caps.

Thomas W. Goings, 17, of Centerville, pleaded guilty to charges of simple larceny when arraigned in Birmingham justice court before Judge John J. Gaffin.

Goings was released after payment of the fine.

HE WAS ARRESTED Thursday by Patrolman Milton Jones and Clayton Armitage, who noticed an old model coupe pull away when they checked the city parking lot at Merrill and Pierce at 10:00 p.m.

The car began to speed ahead as the police car followed it onto Merrill. The coupe then turned left onto Henrietta. It was not in sight, the officers reported, when they followed it to the rear of the lot.

But as the two officers proceeded up the street, they discovered the car parked in front of 366 Henrietta. Flashing a light into the car, the patrolman saw three hub caps, a crow bar, a lug wrench, and a youth staring up at them from the floor forward of the front seat.

RECHECKING of the parking lot revealed three hub caps missing from a car which bore them at 9 p.m., when Jones and Armitage had ticketed it for being backed up to a meter illegally.

The car's owner, Royal Oak school teacher Diane Haskell, made no claim on her coupe when she stops at Birmingham police station to pay her ticket.

Parking Assessment Hearing Dates Set

Two land condemnation resolutions were passed and two parking lot assessment roll confirmation hearings set this week by Birmingham commissioners.

The condemnation proceedings will permit the city to buy Ferrandale south to Hamilton, and get property for a 54-car parking lot at the southwest corner of Hamilton and Hunter (S-11H) if purchase negotiations are unsuccessful on any or all parcels.

April 23 will be the date of special assessment roll hearings on S-11H and S-1A (on the north side of Hamilton between Park and Ferrandale). This is the same night for a similar hearing on Lot 4 (Brownell at Forest).

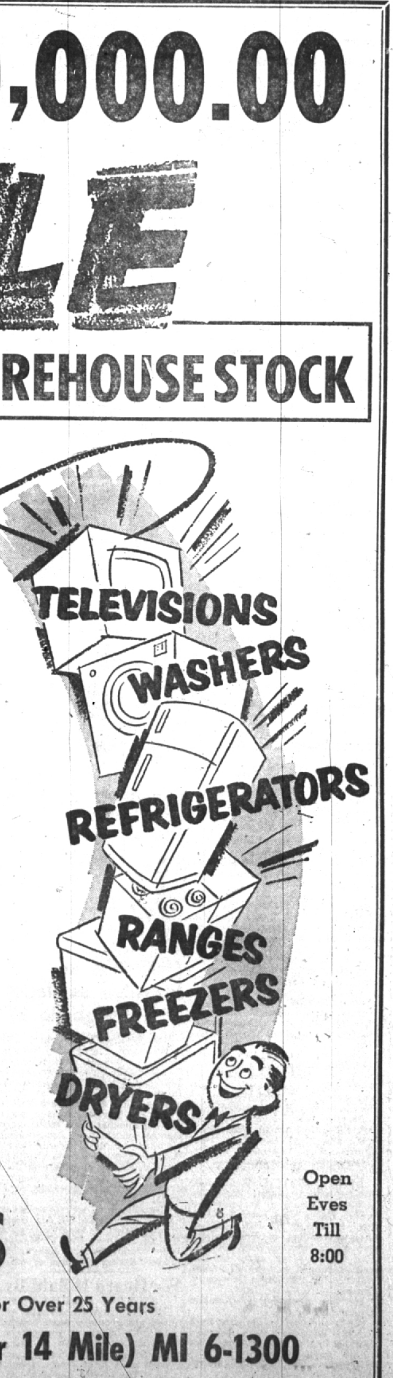
