Parties Original

A Progressive games party is one that is adaptable to almost any number and to any age except real small children.

Supposing you have 20 guests invited. You can plan to set up five bridge tables and divide the group into couples, having two couples play at each table or you can divide them into two's and set up 10 tables.

In any case, the idea is to place on each table a different boxed game such as Cootie, Candyland, Lotto, and Checkers. Provide each of the guests with a score card on which is a space for the score of each game.

WHEN THE PARTY starts, let each couple of each foursome sit at the table of their choice and proceed with the game on this table. If twosomes are playing, they record individual scores. If couples are playing against each other, the winning couple records their winning, each on his or her own card.

Allow a given amount of time for each sitting. If you have fewer tables with less variety of games, then the time can be longer, but if you have many tables and many different games, the playing time should be shorter so all can rotate tables and enjoy all games.

WHEN TIME IS UP, players do not necessarily have to be finished. Just record as winners, the one, or ones, who have the highest score in that time or who are ahead.

At the close of the entire playing session for the evening, have the guests total up their number of wins. High scorer or the high scoring couple of course wins first prize. Second and third winners win second and third prizes respectively.

GAMES NOW MAY be removed from the table and the guests dance or mingle while hostess resets tables with refreshments or midnight snack.

This party is very inexpensive to get to gather as you are apt to have a number of games in your own house that you can use, and if not, any neighbors with children are sure to have them and who no doubt be happy to loan them for one evening.
