



Four 'I's' To Private Sewer Co.

SOUTHFIELD—Now that Southfield voters have approved the 30-year franchise for the privately-owned Southfield Evergreen Corp., the success of the project depends upon four things, according to Eugene Swem, township supervisor:

- 1) Approval of the idea of a private company taking over government functions of drain building, by the county drain commissioner and the State board of health. Both favor the project, said Swem.
- 2) A LEGAL and valid contract with the township for maintenance and operation. There is no difficulty here, said Swem.
- 3) Transportation and disposal agreement to be negotiated through the drain commissioner. "He has given us assurance in writing that this contract will be made," according to Swem.
- 4) Availability of necessary funds. If the funds are made available the sewer will be built, Swem added.

Persons are to come from investors or people who want to pay for their sewer connection in advance.

A GROUP of five investors, who subscribed \$100,000 have applied for a charter for the private corporation and when this charter is approved additional subscriptions will be accepted in any amount, said Swem, adding that when the capital available reaches \$1.3 million, all subscribers will meet to elect a board of directors. The Evergreen sewer, either publicly or privately owned, is being built by Arnold W. Berndt or Robert Kutscher at Baldwin school. They paid only a small enrollment fee of \$2 to participate in the program, which ran from June 18 through August 10. The enrollment was up 16 per cent over the 1955 total. Total attendance was 27 per cent over 1955.

An American flag hangs high at the DeRosier home on Bedford announcing to the neighborhood the family's joy to welcome back home Major Arthur L. DeRosier after 16 months of service in Korea.

Major DeRosier's plane flight from Tokyo made only one stop in Hawaii before landing in San Francisco on Friday, when a telephone call afforded his wife and children their first sound of his voice since his departure last year.

Arriving home Saturday morning, the major is finding great pleasure in simple every-day things, usually taken for granted—light switches, running water and the luxury of driving the family car, instead of a jeep, are a few of the things which hold fascination for him after his months of service and deprivation.

Accustomed to being ticketed for driving 16 miles an hour in a 15 mile zone in Korea, Major DeRosier is also finding it difficult to adjust to the American habit of disregarding posted speed limits. While still unable to serve in the army, the Major will be stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison near Indianapolis after Sept. 12, but this seems near to the family after the long months of the Major's overseas service, especially since he will be able to spend some weekends and holidays with his family.
