County Prosecutor Republican



FREDERICK C. ZIEM, 40, of Pontiac, a lawyer and present prosecuting attorney, says he has personally tried practically every type of criminal case.

He has served as prosecuting attorney since 1953; chief assistant prosecutor two years; assistant prosecutor, three-and-a-half years, and special prosecutor. He was in the army from 1943 to 46.

Ziem promises "vigorous and impartial prosecution of criminals, never however losing sight of protection of rights of innocent persons, and complete co-operation with various other law enforcement agencies."

Ziem says: "I will owe my allegiance solely to the people of Oakland county, with no obligations to any person, special groups, or factions."

ARTHUR W. KOLLIN, 35, of Pontiac, married, three children, graduate of the University of Michigan and Wayne university law school, is former Oakland county assistant prosecuting attorney and present attorney for the Village of Wolverine Lake.

In private practice since 1948, he is president of Pioneer Highlands Civic Assn.; vice president of Pontiac Ski club; past president, Pontiac Jaycees; Kiwanis; Amvets; Elks; Oakland county Bar Assn.; Michigan State Bar, American Bar Assn.; Temple Beth Jacob and Pontiac Democrat club.

Kollin says: "My entire staff will be chosen for capability rather than party affiliation. A full staff will be maintained at all times in the South Oakland county office for convenience of the public and law enforcement agencies. DAVID E. UTLEY, 49, of Pontiac, has been engaged in the active practice of law since 1930.

Utley says: "If elected, it is my intention to vigorously advocate the rights of the people and the public against all violators of the law and to maintain a staff of able assistants who will devote full time in this direction."

WILLIAM A. WELSH, 57, of Royal Oak, did three years of pre-legal work at the University of Georgia, George Washington university and Georgetown university, from where he has two law degrees. An attorney at law, Welsh was formerly active in the American Legion, Knights of Columbus, Exchange club and Eagles. He was formerly attorney for Troy township, and public administrator for Oakland county.

Welsh says the probation department should be expanded with competent and efficient workers and at least one or more psychiatrists should be attached to the prosecutor's office in Pontiac.

"I am in favor of doing away with paid parole boards and tossing this problem into the laps of local parole boards who would serve without salaries and at convenient times and places," says Welsh. He favors releasing the man paroled in his respective community under the guardianship of his local civic organization.

ALLAN M. BULLOCH, 36, of Southfield township, married, has owned and operated a private detective agency in Detroit for the past eight years, handling criminal and domestic investigations.

As a police officer, Bulloch served in World War II and was a prisoner of war.

Bulloch says: "If elected sheriff of Oakland county, I will promote clearer understanding with the citizens and sheriff's department and be more helpful and understanding of our teenagers."

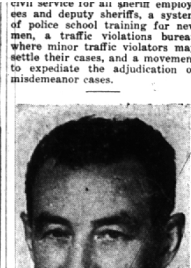


DAVID E. BRANN, of Royal Oak, has been in police work for 32 years, serving under three sheriffs. A detective for eight years, he solved 721 felony cases and received several citations, including one from the FBI.

He is a veteran of World War I, a member of St. Mary's parish, Royal Oak, and of the Fraternal Order of Eagles.

If elected, Brann promises to hire deputies with police experience and says he will make sure all his men are trained properly.

"I'll cooperate with all neighboring departments, show no favoritism, and will keep detectives working on the unsolved cases," Brann said. "We have murderers on the loose, and nobody's bothering to catch them."



GEORGE D. HICKS, 50, of Pontiac, married, three children, has had 22 years experience as a police officer in Pontiac. He is a member of Pontiac Elks, Pontiac Eagles, Moose, past president of the Metropolitan club, Spirit 6; Democrat club; UAW; AFI; Plant Guard Workers of America, and All Saints Episcopal church.

If elected sheriff, Hicks pledges to make every effort to establish the sheriff's department as one of the most efficient agencies in the state.

He says he will provide: honest, capable and efficient personnel; increased road patrols; cooperation with prosecutor's office; rigid enforcement of minor liquor laws; trained personnel for juvenile cases, and an organized juvenile deputy group.
