Southfield
Six projects are currently underway to take care of the influx expected in Southfield schools this fall.
They include the new 15-room E. J. Lederle elementary school, ready at 9 Mile and Evergreen roads, a multi-purpose room and library expected to be ready at Brace school.
Partial completion by opening day is expected on a six-class room, multi-purpose room and library addition at Angling road, and a ten-class room and multi-purpose room at McKinley school.

School Superintendent Schoenfeld said the swimming pool at Southfield high school is expected to be completed by the beginning of the second semester in February.
He said a 30-room junior high school will be ready by the first of the year, School Superintendent Baker said work is in progress on 15 additional rooms at the Stuart K. Baker junior high school on Torphy drive near Rochester road, and should be completed in March.
Work on a new shop at Troy high school will get underway soon, he said, and the former shop is being converted into a library.

Troy Schools
In addition to the Troy Two school which should be ready by the first of the year, School Superintendent Baker said work is in progress on 15 additional rooms at the Stuart K. Baker junior high school on Torphy drive near Rochester road, and should be completed in March.
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Parochial Schools
Enrollment at Holy Name school may be increased from 700 to 950 when a six-classroom addition is completed after the first of the year.
At Our Lady Queen of Martyrs 12-room school, the seventh grade will be added this fall, according to the Rev. Leo E. Totte, assistant pastor.
Fr. Totte said enrollment this fall would be about 500 pupils, 100 more than last year. Approximately 200 additional students will be accommodated by a proposed four-classroom addition, plus cafeteria and music room, to be started within the next two months.

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Egbert Reveals Contract Details To City Commission

Former city manager Don C. Egbert reported to the Birmingham city commission Monday night the details of a contract providing sewage disposal to sections of Bloomfield township and Troy.
Speaking as Birmingham's representative on the North Evergreen sewerage authority, Egbert said a contract had been drawn up providing for a payment of \$100 for interim use of Birmingham sewage facilities that may be utilized before Jan. 1 and for the remainder of the year by the three participating units at a cost of \$450 per quarter. In the event the North Evergreen interceptor does not go through.
Commissioners referred the contract to City Attorney Forbes Hascall for study.

NORTHWESTERN highway extension to M-55 as a limited access highway will probably be put under contract next year, said Foster.
Route location studies for an Interstate route from a connection with the I-75 highway to the extension near Southfield and Eight Mile road north, by-passing the I-75 highway, and connecting with the Fenton-Ohio Expressway south and west of Flint are now nearing completion. The implementation of this route and the immediate undertaking of detail plans preparatory to construction are predicated upon the assumption that the highway department will be built in the foreseeable future," said Foster.

Nine-Year-Old Boy Drowns At B'ham Country Club Pool

All efforts of a fire department rescuer crew to revive a nine-year-old Detroit boy at Birmingham Country Club swimming pool Thursday were futile, and a physician pronounced the boy dead at the Birmingham hospital.
Lifeguard George Stinnett, 19, of 1540 Villa, said he pulled Bert F. Metcalf, 1111, Detroit, from the water. He and the other guard on duty at the time, David Schutte, 19, of 32015 Rover drive, Southfield, applied artificial respiration until the rescuer arrived.
Swimming pool supervisor Jay Myers said the boy could not swim, and that a water mask, usually worn over the eyes, was believed to be responsible for the boy's death.
Club manager John Brennan said that Stinnett turned to stop two children from running alongside the pool, then noticed the boy in four to five feet of water, standing erect with his head only about two inches below the surface. The mask was partially filled with water and over the boy's nose and mouth, Brennan said.

The resignation of Assistant City Manager Dana Whitman was submitted to new Birmingham City Manager Harold Schone Monday.
Whitman told The Eccentric that he plans to leave August 31 to accept the position of city manager in Newton, New Jersey.
His announcement came on Schone's first day at the city manager's desk. Whitman said negotiations on his new position had been underway for several months but that arrangements were not finalized until Saturday.
Schone said that efforts to secure a replacement for Whitman had not gotten underway. But he added, "I would hope that some replacement could be found before he leaves so that Whitman can go over the work with that person."
Necessity for Whitman to leave next week, Schone said, came up because of the urgency for the present assistant city manager to get to another community.
"It's a step up for him," Schone said.

Whitman said he planned to vacation with his family for a few days before going on to the New Jersey city of 6,000 population, where he is to report September 10.
