### Takes Midshipman Training Cruise

**Says the Barrister**

You're thankful our Supreme Court concerns itself with some apparently trifling matters of the little people.

It used to be that when I thought of the United States Supreme Court, I pictured nine stately gentlemen pondering momentous issues involving prominent people and huge corporations.

Then recently I read about some of the more important Supreme Court decisions.

The issues turned out to be grave and far-reaching, to be sure, but the people involved were just ordinary folks who looked to the United States Constitution for protection—and received it.

ONE of the great decisions leading up to the Civil War and the eventual end of slavery revolved around a humble Negro slave who sought freedom.

It was a poultry dealer in New York whose court case knocked out the complex National Recovery Administration program of the early 1930's, a voluntary plan of controls which affected almost every American business.

Even such a "simple" matter as litter on the streets of a small Georgia community, Griffin by name, became an issue of national import.

GRIFFIN WAS a town which made you get a license to hand out leaflets. People threw away the leaflets and made the streets unsightly, said the town elders. To prove a point, one man invited arrest by breaking the local law on purpose.

His case went through the state courts, and finally to the U. S. Supreme Court. This question involved a fundamental constitutional guarantee: freedom of the press. Was distribution in a mere Bill of American right to free press?

NO ONE had been kept from printing what he pleased, merely from handing out what had been printed.

The learned judges delved into the meaning of a free press, from the first article in the Bill of Rights clear back to John Milton's great essay on the subject in 1644 after one of his pamphlets had been banned in England.

The Supreme Court decision on an obscure Georgia municipal ordinance affected the whole nation. Said the Court: Liberty of circulation is essential to the liberty of publishing.

IT BORE out John Milton's steadfast contention that the truth need never fear a free and open contest with falsehood.

Or take the group of West Virginians whose religion dictated that they owed all allegiance to God, although they would pledge "respect" to the nation's flag. They were upheld when they resisted a compulsory flag salute by their children in public school.

Even in the heat of wartime, the Supreme Court, after searching the history of Christianity back to its suppression in early Rome, said that a man could not be forced to utter what was not in his mind.

I'm mighty glad that even the highest court in the land takes a hand in the affairs of "the little people."

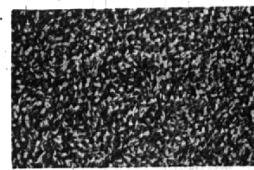
