Reduce Charges Against Ex-Judge

LATHRUP — Former Justice of the Peace L. Bernard Cross pleaded guilty last Wednesday to drunk driving but the plea was refused and charges reduced to reckless driving by Clawson Justice Harry R. McQuinn.

Cross paid \$115 in fine and costs and was placed on one-year's probation by McQuinn who suspended a 30-day jail term.

Cross was arrested early Aug. 13 by Clawson police who said Cross was driving at 70 miles per hour on the wrong side of 14 Mile road, and that the ex-justice had been drinking.

Dry Cleaners Get Lathrup's Approval

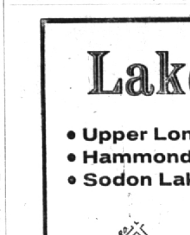
LATHRUP — Approval of sewer plans was given to Munson Cleaners, which intends to build at the northwest corner of Coral Gables and Southfield road.

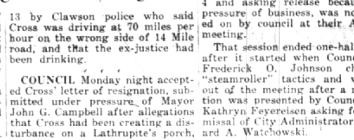
