In Santiago, Santa Lucia hill, covered with acacia trees was a beautiful sight, as was the flight over the Andes to Buenos Aires. This, said Mrs. DeOrlow, was the most modern of all cities.

After three days here, she flew to Montevideo where she visited the beautiful government buildings, Persian rug patterns, reproduced in mosaic tile, form the floors of these buildings.

Highlight in Rio de Janeiro was the view of the 500 ft. statue of Christ over 300 feet up the mountain. From Rio de Janeiro, a 2,500 mile non-stop flight over unexplored jungle, across the equator and the Amazon river to Caracas completed the tour, and after a short stop to refuel here, they were homeward bound, heavily laden with souvenirs from each of the republics.
