An exception to this will be all eighth grade students. All eighth graders from Southfield will attend Southfield No. 10 junior high school this year. Their school day will begin at 8:10 a.m. and end at 2:20 p.m. They will follow the same first day schedule as the elementary classes on Wednesday.

The entire Southfield faculty will meet at 9 a.m. at Southfield high school and then the high school and elementary teachers will break up at 10:30 for two individual sessions.
