

Troy Schools Begin Classes September 6

TROY — Troy township schools and new registrations beginning Sept. 6. The high school office will also be open from 9:30 to 3:00 beginning Aug. 27, when principal, Richard Drager, will take new registrations and make registration changes.

ALL SCHOOLS will be in full session Thursday. Buses will be available for those eligible. Buses will start to pick up junior and senior high school students at 7:15 a.m. Troy high school and Baker junior high school classes will start at 8:00 a.m.

Buses will start at 8:15 a.m. for students attending Big Beaver and Poppleton schools where classes will start at 8:45 a.m. Buses will start at 8:45 a.m. for students attending Smith, Troy 2, Colerain and Troy Union schools. Classes at these four schools will start at 9:15 a.m.

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SEVENTH and eighth grade students will register at Baker junior high school and will go directly to home rooms for registration by home room teachers. A list posted in the front entrance will designate home rooms. The principal, Boyd Larson, will be in his office for parental conferences.

THE HOT LUNCH program will be in operation in all schools except Big Beaver which will have a daily milk program. Elementary lunches cost 30¢, junior and senior high school lunches will cost 35¢. Adults may buy their lunch ala carte or a complete lunch for 45¢.

Elementary students, kindergarten through six, will pay a fee of \$2.00 to cover cost of workbooks and other expendable material. A book deposit of \$1.00 is required of all seventh grade students and all new students in grades eight through twelve.

Tuesday, Sept. 4, and Wednesday, Sept. 5, at 9:00 a.m. there will be faculty meetings of all teachers. In the afternoons, the teachers will meet with the principals in their respective schools.
