Parties Original

The fall of the year is wonderful hiking weather. Mornings are crisp and beautiful, days are warm, but not too hot and the evenings are perfect for bon-fires. Herein you will find suggestions for several kinds of hiking parties, adaptable to all ages.

A Hobo hike is each a good old standby. Give to each guest a bandana handkerchief (or any large square of gaily decorated material). Have ready a package of food wrapped in oiled paper to be tied into the bandana. A good food combination might be wieners or cubed steaks, candy bar, fruit and marshmallows. Someone driving to the destination could take the bus and beverage.

FOR THIS HIKE, the distance might be about a mile to some spot where a fire can be built for roasting the meat and marshmallows. Before eating, play about three good, fast outdoor games or one game of baseball. Eat and hike back home.

For a day-time hike, try a Tall Tales hike. For this you divide the groups into couples, threes or fours. Tell them the designated destination and let them choose their route, each set going a different way.

Enroute, they are to explore and observe anything of interest so that when they join the group they can tell a tale about things they saw and did on the way. They may also collect specimens and examples to prove their tale.

WHEN THE GROUP is assembled, let a spokesman from each set tell the tale they have prepared while the picnic lunch is eaten. For the trip back, divide the entire group into two teams.

Provide one team with plenty of chalk and give them a ten-minute head-start. They are to mark every turn on the route they choose with the chalk, making arrows on trees

and posts. The other team is to follow the trail.

FOR A GOOD peppy afternoon hike for children 10 to 14 years of age, Trail and Tag hunt is fun. For this, the group is divided into two teams. Give each team a name for added interest.

The first team is provided with several bags of confetti and given a head start of about 20 to 30 minutes. They sprinkle confetti all along the trail. When they reach their destination they hide, individually.

The second team follows the trail of confetti and upon arriving at the destination, find the hidden team and tag them, one by one. On the return trip, the teams reverse and the taggers lay the trail and the others follow it and tag them as they are hidden somewhere around the home base.

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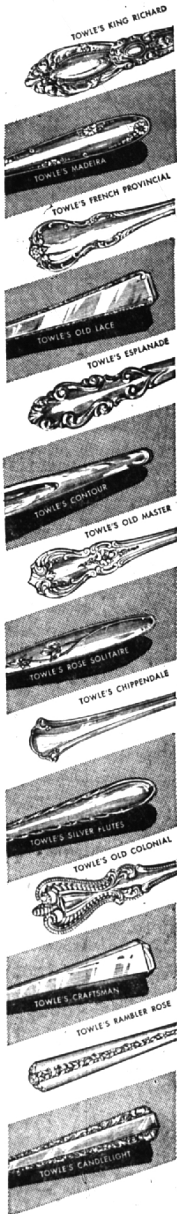
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
