

Special Assessment Projects in Process

SOUTHFIELD—To speed up work on Southampton sewers, township board last night called for confirmation of the rolls on estimated prices given last year for the subdivision's lateral sewers.

Mrs. Fannie Adams, township clerk, explained that haste was needed to beat a Dec. 3 deadline, when, if Southampton voted to become a city, Southampton sewer public hearings and other mechanics of a special assessment improvement would have to begin for the third time.

The area was denied sewers when they failed to complete mechanics of the special assessment process by June 7, 1955, and because Southfield could not bond, have been at a standstill ever since.

With a new law allowing townships in the process of incorporation to bond, the subdivision is back asking for the badly-needed sewers.

The estimated price is about \$32,000 or \$3.87 a front foot. Bids will be received until Sept. 10 when they will be opened. Sept. 10 is the public hearing, residents of Southampton will hear how much over or under the estimate the actual cost will be.

"What do you gain from this sewer in relation to what you have in the last six months?" asked E. E. Ballard of 17262 Redwood.

"WE ARE not about to subject you or any other area to a double price for sanitary sewers," said Trustee Luther Wagner.

"In this area, and for this purpose you'll never be assessed for another drain," said Supervisor Eugene Swain.

Public hearings were also set for Sept. 11 on several other special assessment projects, by the board also called for bids.

Road paving petitions for Peakskill and Waycross in South Edgewood Hills were approved. Cost estimates for Peakskill are figured at about \$13,267.50 and for Waycross at \$11,685, plus 15 per cent for engineering costs.
