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As well as other individuals and communities are under pressure from the Water Resources Commission to end pollution of the Rouge River, and because of Southfield's indefinite city township status, it has been impossible to get bonding for a public sewer. Dell pointed to State law which authorizes voting on franchises at either special or regular elections, and which allows use of streets to the franchise grantee.

"Any person can be a member," said Dell in answer to Greenfield's belief that the sewer would be restricted and that everyone wanting a connection would not be allowed to participate without being charged excessive rates. The township has final control of rates, said Dell.

"WHAT ARE we going to do with the Evergreen Interceptor that is in the making for two years?" asked Gillespie, who added that the private sewer might later block improvements needed by other parts of the township. Both sewers were to parallel Evergreen road between 14 Miles and Eight Mile.

The first Evergreen sewer was planned to include Lathrup and the northern communities of Birmingham, Troy, Bloomfield Hills and Bloomingfield as well as Southfield, but fell through because final arrangements were not made to meet a court order deadline for announcing methods to be used by the several communities to end Rouge pollution.

Dell, calling the Evergreen Interceptor sewer an "anagram," said "There is no reason why this (privately-owned) proposition during the past 18 months, said, 'There is no reason why this (privately-owned) sewer plan works out, cannot become a part of any other (township) sewer'."
