

Bloomfield Hills Serves 22,679

One thousand, eighty lunches were served daily to students in the Bloomfield Hills school system during October, making a total of 22,679 for the month. The children drank 41,469 bottles of milk during the month. To serve the lunches; \$5,941.04 was spent for labor of 19 women working five to eight hours per day, and \$6,207.53 was spent for food (in addition to surplus commodities).

Probably no fashion show ever had more models than there were in the "Miss Betty Barnum" style show at Barnum junior high school Friday night.

And the 115 young models wouldn't have been as proud of Christian Dior originals as they were of the skillfully made outfits they modeled. For each model made her ensemble herself.

In another homemaking project, cooking students made the Brownies, coconut drops, sugar cookies and fancy sandwiches the girls served their audiences after the show. Even the silver Christmas tree centerpieces were prepared by "all-purpose" homemaking students, who hung them with colorful miniature skirts like those in the show.

THE ALL-PURPOSE students, whose study concentrates on such homemaking angles as home furnishings, family relations, child care and good grooming, made other contributions to the fashion show. They prepared a holiday "pink lady" punch with cranberry juice, and made the holly-leaf folder invitations each model was permitted to send to two parents or two adults.

It was the first time the Barnum sewing students, who previously modeled their sewing accomplishments before other homemaking students only, had invited their parents to a style show.

The girls' invited guests saw seventh graders model skirts, while eighth graders displayed two-piece outfits and ninth graders paraded

Daniels and Mrs. Ruth Beebe agreed that seventh grade girls usually display the most interest.

"Seventh graders are just getting old enough to begin to accept responsibility for some of these tasks at home," said foods teacher Mrs. Beebe. "Everything is pretty new to them, and they are eager to dig into even the most routine clean-up job."

"**THE SEWING** students who are the most capable," says homemaking teacher Mrs. Barbara Armittage, "are the ones who enjoy it most."

Other Barnum homemaking teachers commented on the girls' enjoyment of various phases of their homemaking assignment.

"**WE HEAR THE** girls talk about what they want their wedding gowns to be like, where

they're going on their honeymoon, and all the glamorous aspects of marriage," said sewing teacher Mrs. Virginia Fisher.

"But when they start washing dishes, some of them say they don't want to be housewives!"

Future housewives or not, junior high school girls are being prepared for the household tasks which may confront them some

day! During grades seven and eight, each girl student takes 12 weeks of cooking, sewing, and "all-purpose" work.

But one homemaking skill, their teachers find, seldom has to be taught. They observed that, "Almost without exception, by the time they begin seventh grade homemaking classes, the girls know how to open a can!"
