Issue of February 23

Issue of March 1
Birmingham's 1956 assessed valuation will be up about \$14 million, city assessor Elmer W. Haack estimated this week. Haack said all but a half-million of this additional valuation came from new residential and commercial structures and 30 per cent boost in all residential land values.

Four candidates will contest for two vacant Birmingham city commission three year terms. At Saturday's deadline, nominating petitions had been filed for incumbent Mayor Charles Renfrew, city plan board member Carl F. Juranham, Donald K. Fill and Omar Hansen.

Barnum school PTA is presenting its second Learnschool next week with a panel of 20 psychologists, psychiatrists, educators and social workers leading discussions on junior high teen-ager problems.

Issue of March 8
Congressman George A. Dondero has announced he would not be a candidate for re-election to the U. S. House of Representatives from Michigan's 18th district.

Results of the Birmingham Community House Roll Call drive, which ended March 5, showed the drive still \$13,000 short, although Mrs. George Weinstahl, drive chairman, is hopeful the goal of \$50,000 will be met.

Long-time Birmingham residents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Heacock, 1261 Bank road, Bloomfield township, celebrated their Golden anniversary Sunday with an open house.

Three Flags D.A.R. presented a plaque to Brooks school, the oldest school in Southfield township, at eleven Mile and Lahser roads. The school, built in 1841, was named the Bedford school for the owner of the nearby farm, postoffice and cheese factory. Almost 100 years later it was renamed Brooks school.

Monday, Franklin village residents will choose a village president, treasurer, clerk, assessor and three councilmen for the two year term and will decide whether they want liquor sold by the glass. Candidates for the council race are Mrs. Charles C. Layman, Harry B. Rottiers, Homer D. Hyde and Rob-

ert Mitchell. Village president Harold A. Roseberry is opposed by Orland H. Ellis. Treasurer Norman G. Curran and assessor Walter K. M. Rodgers are unopposed.

Lathrup's post-office will be located temporarily in House-in-the-Woods, Mayor John G. Campbell announced this week.

Issue of March 15
Birmingham Town Hall completes its next season's program with Dr. Norman Vincent Peale headlining the series. Birmingham Town Hall will continue to give duplicate programs on Thursday and Friday and celebrity luncheons will be held following each lecture.

Birmingham's brand new city assessor, Wilfred E. Taylor, resigned from his five-day-old job to return to Battle Creek, Birmingham assessor Elmer W. Haack has agreed to remain as consultant for about 60 days to help out the city.

William M. Brown, 66, of 649 Shirley drive, Birmingham, died Tuesday after a brief illness. He was a former vice chairman of Birmingham's planning board and was manager of the Detroit Shopping News from 1933.
