No Petitions Yet For Charter Posts

SOUTHFIELD—So far no nominating petitions have been filed with Oakland county clerk by candidates for charter commission, although a number of petitions are being circulated, according to Mrs. Fannie Adams, township clerk.

Deadline for filing is March 12. Some who are believed to be circulating petitions are Ray McLeod, Henry J. DeWegen, Marvin R. Marsh and Edward A. Elsarrelli.

A positive method of regulating and measuring sewage flow will be necessary, added Palmer.

Only sewer in operation is the Southeastern, in which, according to county officials, sewage flow will probably be increased.

Planned to handle area growth for some time to come, perhaps up to 1975 to 1980 or later, the Evergreen sewer will start off using only about 30 cfs, said county drain officials.

Specifically, where is pollution taking place? In Bloomfield township and Birmingham, it is occurring by inadequate treatment going through the Birmingham treatment plant and on down to the Rouge.

Southfield is causing pollution in the Acacia drain in the north-eastern area of the township. Washington Village subdivision in Section 26 is discharging sewage into an open ditch which goes into a covered sewer and on into Detroit.

Swen says there are, in all, about 14 known points of pollution in the township, but not all are known yet by WRC officials.

Two other areas that must be cleaned up are along Nine Mile road where septic tank overflow connects to drain under the highway and goes into the Rouge, and in the Plum Hollow area where, in summer, with heavy water demands for golf course upkeep, the stream south of the course dries

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up, and there is not enough water to carry away sewage.

Ralph A. Main, Oakland county drain commissioner, whose authority extends over Acacia drain in Southfield, was cited by court decree similar to that given to Lathrup last month to clear pollution in that area.

Elmer Kephart, Bloomfield Hills city manager, and chairman of the EI authority, said there were five points in the city where sewage was flowing into the branch of the Rouge running through the city.

Main pollution area, said Kephart, was in the city's center where septic tank overflow was being picked up by a stream running under Woodward.

Last sample taken (where the stream leaves the city) showed less bacteria present than in ponds and lakes where swimming is allowed, said Kephart.

WHAT HAPPENS if the Evergreen Interceptor project folds? Some state officials have already said the Evergreen interceptor is a dream.

Most concerned agree, however, that it is the one good solution to the problem: if it is attainable.

Should it not materialize, Troy, Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield township and Birmingham would turn to the latter's sewage treatment plant.

But deadlines are closing in on them and unless Southfield's position becomes clear soon, those northern areas will have to tell the courts that they are going to expand Birmingham's plant.

Swen said that although no commitment, other than oral, has been made with Detroit, it is believed that the authority would be charged about 35c to 40c per 1,000 cubic feet of flow for conveying the sewage through the Detroit treatment plant.

WE FEEL that the board (Oakland county board of supervisors) erred in declaring the entire township as one drainage district. The officials of both Franklin and Birmingham Farms have requested that these (village) areas be placed in a separate drainage district.

Southfield voters rejected a millage proposal in Nov. 1954, to pay for the allocated cost of the EI. Another proposal, the wording of which was confusing to the electorate, to provide drains for the entire township, was approved on April 4, 1955.

Deadline for filing petitions is noon, Feb. 25. Open besides the posts mentioned above are that of president, clerk, treasurer, and two council seats.

On the ballot, too, will be a proposal to determine whether Franklinites want to have liquor sold by the glass.

Commissioners and the elected officials of the proposed city determine on what taxing basis such projects should be constructed.
