 to make." He cited two reasons for his unexpected move.
 1) Serious heart attack suffered by his father in New Hampshire since his coming to Birmingham which is now complicated by double-pneumonia.
 2) Quality of job which he considered too good to turn down.
 LANDRY came to Birmingham to direct the recreation program after resigning a similar post in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, which he held for two years.
 "I have been offered the job of recreation director for the Portsmouth Air Force base," Landry told the board, "and with ten years in the navy; the position with the Federal government gives me the opportunity of using that time toward eventual retirement benefits."
 Landry came to Birmingham with the understanding that the Portsmouth job would be open for two years but was contacted last week and told he could have the position immediately.

"I PROBABLY would have refused the job if it hadn't been for my father's illness," Landry said, "but after talking the whole thing over with my family, I decided it was the move to make. Believe me, after buying a house here and just getting settled, it wasn't an easy decision."
 Landry's resignation, effective immediately, was accepted by the board. He left early Friday morning for Portsmouth.
 Rollie Reese, board member, expressed his regret at Landry's leaving, but sympathized with Landry's personal problems.
 "I know you would have done a good job if you stayed," Reese told Landry.

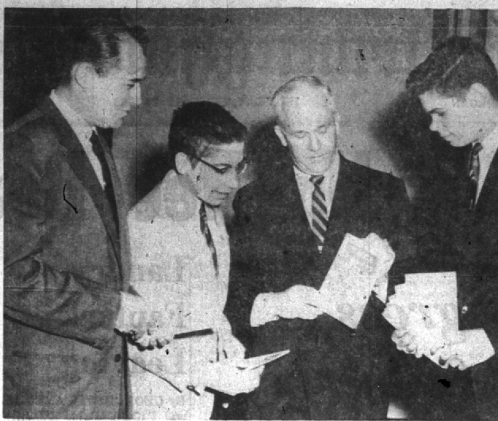
