290 EGGS per HEN

New All-time State Record with

DEKALB CHIX

In Missouri, a DEKALB flock averaged 290 eggs for Ernest Schmetzler at Salisbury, establishing a new state record in the University of Missouri's Extension Poultry Record Keeping Program. Schmetzler housed 185 birds, and lost ONLY 7 birds during the year ending August 31, 1955, (3 from moldy feed).
