BIRD

This is not a fellow or guy. Nor is it a hissing sound of disapproval. We are concerned only with a class of warm-blooded vertebrates with bodies covered with feathers and forelimbs modified to form wings.

Birds add charm and character to even the smallest plot, their subtle instincts often astounding the intelligence of observers.

They also interest by posing (this the men know all about), preening (this the ladies know about), courting (this you all may know about), mating () and nesting (electric blankets are not used).

No one should be in a better position to appreciate the vast contribution birds make to our economic life than a gardener.

For instance (and this probably will ruin our sale-of insecticides):—

Birds eat 300 weed seeds per day for every foot of American farm land.

A Bobolink east from 5,000 to 15,000 weed seeds a day.

Birds search every plant, tree and shrub as meticulously as you scrub Junior for harmful insect life (on the plants, not Junior). Even rats and mice fall prey to the larger, predatory birds.

The smallest bird is a tiny humming bird . . . the largest is an ostrich. The big stiff can't fly but he sure can run—and kicks like a steer. Birds swim and dive in the sea . . . some feed on the BOTTOM of swift-running, icy cold mountain streams. One variety flies 22,000 miles non-stop twice a year. Some live in the country, some exist in the city. Have you heard the story about the fat country sparrow and the thin city sparrow? Ask some friend to tell it to you. We won't.

Many birds are used for their eggs and for meat . . . some for feathers and others for entertainment. One bird (one species, that is) produces prodigious quantities of an important fertilizer.

These little creatures have fewer bones than a cat, a trout or a frog. And their bones are filled with air pockets into which they pump air to increase their buoyancy. The bones lock together into a very rigid frame . . . not all all like some of our slouching youngsters.

The feathers are used for filling in hollows in the bird's form, for flying, pillows, warmth, etc. and every bird sheds all his feathers at least once a year . . . not all at once, however.

Have you ever seen a peacock raise its beautiful fan of tail feathers? No, you haven't! They are not tail feathers . . . they are fastened to its back and the tail is used for balancing.

Birds are good parents, also. They keep the young at home and feed them until they can fly and "go it alone".

Actually, you cannot afford to be without birds. It is said that the last living thing on this earth will be an insect. Let us delay this gruesome day by helping our beautiful and valiant ally and the

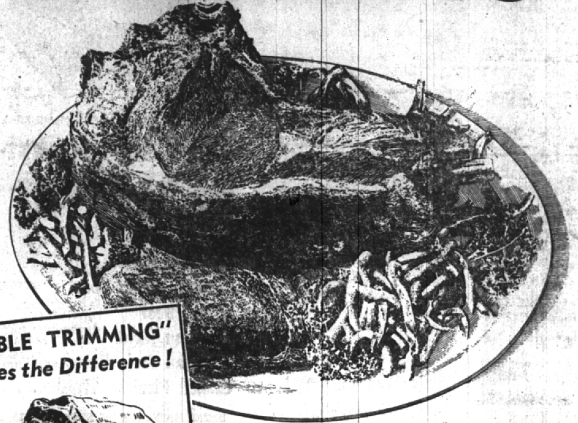
