



**Work With Indians To Be Discussed At Mission School**

A missionary to Indian Americans in Arizona will appear on the program of the eighth annual "School of World Missions" to be

conducted at First Baptist church, Birmingham. He is the Rev. Perry L. Jackson, a teacher and preacher whose work is centered in Cottonwood, Ariz.

Mr. Jackson will speak on Wednesday, Feb. 8, at 7:45 p.m. Other speakers and features will be highlighted during the school which continues through February.

Sessions of the school are held every Wednesday evening. The school got under way last night with a pictorial presentation prepared by Dr. Richard Cummings, newly elected executive secretary of the Detroit Baptist Missionary society.

**EACH EVENING** there will be held a church family supper at 7 p.m. Following the supper will be a devotional period and special music. There will be classes for children, including handwork on the mission theme.

The mission study course is for adults and youth. Two general themes will be followed throughout the school, "home" study of "Indian Americans" and "foreign" study of "Christian Missions in a Revolutionary World."

While the school is intended primarily for members and friends of the church, it is open to all interested persons. There is no charge.



**Missionary Here To Tell Of Work In East Africa**

Arriving in Birmingham yesterday was the Rev. Tage E. V. Adolffson, a Methodist minister in Sweden, who is serving as a missionary under the American board of missions in Inhambane, Mozambique, Portuguese East Africa. He will be guest speaker at several meetings of First Methodist church organizations throughout the week. He has been invited to Birmingham to participate in the annual observance of Mission month at First Methodist church, and will be presented to the congregation on Sunday.

Mr. Adolffson will bring recent work and greetings from Dr. and Mrs. Walter Mikulaeche, who represent First Methodist church as medical missionaries in Africa, and with whom he has been working at the same mission station in Mozambique.
