Hire Berkley We Have Seen Man to Fill City Vacancy

LATHRUP—David J. Bourgeois, 34, of 1723 Mortenson, Berkley, has been hired by Leonard A. Watchowski, city administrator, at an annual salary of \$4,600.

Bourgeois, hired to replace Andrew F. Butt, building inspector who resigned to take a similar post in Birmingham, will be on a 60-day trial basis, and if proved satisfactory, will be given a \$5,122 annual wage.

An employe with Huntington Woods for five years, Bourgeois takes over, besides the building inspector's job, that of hearing inspector, daytime police officer and juvenile officer.

HE COMES TO Lathrup well equipped for the last two posts. While in Huntington Woods Bourgeois served as detective sergeant in the police force, was juvenile officer, prepared municipal records and served as volunteer fireman. He has had blueprint instructions in school and while in service.

Bourgeois was one of six applicants interviewed. There were 12 applications received, according to Watchowski.

Lathrup's newest employe has a wife, Madgion, a daughter, Susan, 4 and a son, Gregory, 2.

"It is going to be wonderful working in such a community," said Bourgeois, who added that he thought the post offered opportunity for learning and advancement.

Declare Intention Of Joining Area Rubbish Authority

LATHRUP—Council declared their intention to join the SOEC Garbage and Rubbish Authority Saturday at an adjourned meeting.

Actual contract signing, however, pending investigation by City Attorney Everett F. Hayes into terms of the contract.

Council also rejected all bids received recently on the city's rubbish contract, and will ask for new bids in light of the city's planned move into the authority.

LEONARD A. Watchowski, city administrator, told council that George Schmidt, rubbish authority head, told him authority members would vote Lathrup out unless he made a decision soon to either drop out of the authority or begin hauling their rubbish to that authority's dump.

Lathrup had been committed under a contract made by Southfield before Lathrup incorporated. The 30-year contract contemplated by the city would assure the city a place to dump refuse as dumping areas become less abundant.

Council also wants to be sure the new contract would give them voting rights in the authority.
