It was a hockey game to end all hockey games with the dads win-

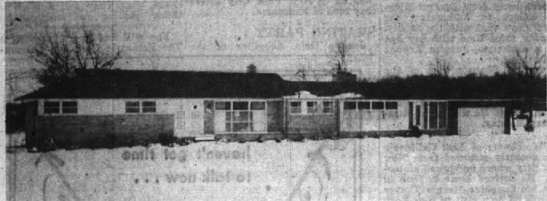

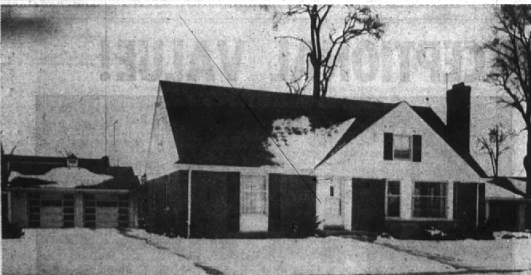

Wash. Village Lists Desired Charter Points

SOUTHFIELD — Washington Village Civic Association, in Section 25, voted almost unanimously Tuesday to have their spokesman and president, Vincent Soto, back six points to be included in the charter.

Soto carried the opinion of his 165-family subdivision to the township-wide association meeting held last night to get the feeling of the residents on whether they wished to have their spokesman and if they did, when they would want the proposed charter to include:

1. Maintenance of the present township tax rate.
 2. Election of chief city officers for two-year terms.
 3. Civil service for township employees.
 4. Strong manager-type government.
 5. Election of city clerk and treasurer.
 6. Reaffirmation that the association is 100 per cent in favor of incorporation.
- Soto said his group's support or lack of support to the next charter would depend on how many of the above points were included in the document.

Dogs' Rabies Shots To Be Given Feb. 19

SOUTHFIELD—Rabies vaccination of township dogs will be conducted at the township fire hall, Nine Mile and Prosper on Feb. 19 from 1 to 4 p.m., under county board of health supervision.

Dog licenses in Southfield cannot be obtained unless the dog has been vaccinated, either by a private veterinarian or through the local clinic.

Dr. Theodore Barr will supervise the vaccination clinic. Price of immunization is \$1.50. Strength of the shots lasts one year, health board officials said.

Women's Club To Hear Mary V. Beck Monday

LATHRUP—Detroit councilwoman, Mary V. Beck hosted four members of the Lathrup Woman's Club in her offices in the City-County building in downtown Detroit last week.

Miss Beck, reporting upon her scooter with the Atom bomb, will be guest speaker at the meeting of the Lathrup Woman's club Monday, Feb. 6 at 1:30 p.m., at the House in the Woods, when the club celebrates its 10th birthday.

Miss Beck is a source of inspiration and pride to the women of Detroit, having been the first woman to be elected to the common council in 1949. The third time elected, she became president pro tem by virtue of her high number of votes.

SHE HAS unlocked the door of politics to the women of this area and continues to swing it ever wider as her "first" list grows longer.

The first woman to become acting president of the common council, the first woman to become acting mayor of Detroit, and in 1955, the first woman to be appointed chairman of the Ways and Means committee of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors.

Mary V. Beck prepared herself well for the role she is playing. With degrees in sociology and law from the University of Pittsburgh,

four years of study and travel in Europe, then further study at Wayne and the University of Michigan, Miss Beck has much to offer her community.

SHE WAS chosen as an observer for Civil Defense to view the atomic explosion at Yucca Flats and with Major General Clyde E. Dougherty, Civil Defense chief, was the only Detroit official to remain throughout the repeated delays to the explosion on May 5, 1955.

"Terrifying but magnificent" were Mary Beck's words as she stood on Horrible Hill, overlooking the Nevada desert, scene of the atomic destruction.

Chairman for the birthday tea is Mrs. Walter H. Serenber, with Mrs. Arthur Mitchell, Mrs. C. H. Erbacher, Mrs. William D. White, Mrs. Verne Blake and Mrs. Derikson H. Worden on her committee.

Pouring will be Mrs. Earl M. Doig, first president of Lathrup Woman's club, 1939-41, and Mrs. Conrad Bloom, past president, 1953-55.
