Food Ordinance Gets Final Review

SOUTHFIELD—An ordinance to license and control food handlers sent back to Township Attorney Harry N. Bell by trustees last week for last minute corrections.

It probably will be adopted when the township board meets again, either at its regular meeting Feb. 14, or sooner at a special meeting, if one is called.

Fees set by the board were \$12 yearly for most businesses and \$2 a week or \$1 if the license is granted for one day.

Those stores under the \$12 fee are poultry markets which will be charged \$18 and fish markets, \$15. A combined meat and grocery license would cost \$18 yearly. License to sell ice cream is \$12 a year if ice cream is the only food sold. If ice cream is sold in a store which is otherwise licensed, an ice cream fee is not necessary, the ordinance prescribes.
